

COUNTY TEACHERS' INSTITUTE OPENS HERE TOMORROW

One-Day Session Will Be Held at Senior High School for Instructions — Program Is Announced

The annual Jackson County Teachers' Institute will open tomorrow in the senior high school building. It will last one day only, instead of the usual two. The curtailment was due to financial stringency. Close to 200 teachers will be in attendance. LANDOWNERS VOTE FRIDAY ON REFUND IRRIGATION BONDS

Landowners of the Medford Irrigation district will vote tomorrow (Friday) to authorize the issuance of \$460,000 of refunding bonds, for the purpose of retiring and refunding \$1,147,000 in bonds of the district, with accrued interest since January, 1931.

Application has been made to the R. F. C. for a \$460,000 loan and it is sought to authorize the bonds for the purpose of issuing them to R. F. C. if the application for the loan is granted.

The law under which the new bonds are to be issued provides for a limited liability on the part of the lands of the district. No tract of land can be taxed for more than its pro rata share of the amount necessary to pay these bonds, except for a small emergency assessment which can be levied, if necessary, in the event of heavy delinquencies in tax payments.

In addition to this any tract of land in the district can be taken out from under the bonded debt and relieved from all further liability for assessments for the payment of bond principal and interest (with the exception of the emergency assessment above referred to) by surrendering bonds or paying cash in the amount of such tract's pro rata share of the debt.

The directors desire that a large vote be polled, as it might materially help in the securing of the R. F. C. loan.

Those whose lands lie in the district north of Barneberg road and east of Bear creek will vote in the Hillcrest packing house; those who live south of Medford between Barneberg road and Kings highway, will vote at the Ever Shady Auto camp; those whose lands lie west of Kings highway and Bear creek will vote at the Oak Grove school house.

The Oregon Reclamation congress will be held at Baker, September 21 and 22 and because every irrigation district in the state has made application to the R. F. C. for a loan, there are many finance problems to be discussed and the congress, therefore, holds unusual interest.

A number from this county will attend, including Olen Arnsperger, general manager of local irrigation districts, who is scheduled to make a three-minute address.

RUINS SCoured FOR VICTIMS OF TEXAS TORNADO

HALLINGEN, Tex., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Army ambulance detachments today began a systematic search through hitherto inaccessible sections of the hurricane-devastated lower Rio Grande valley for injured refugees.

It was considered likely additional fatalities would be discovered in remote communities unheard from since the disastrous storm abated.

A preliminary survey by the Red Cross, covering that part of the stricken area linked by paved highways, accounted for 4 deaths and hundreds of persons injured. There were found to be 3750 families, destitute; 4000 homes destroyed and 8,000 damaged.

Four persons lost their lives at Hallingen, two at San Benito, seven at Rio Hondo, one at Fort Stabel, two in rural communities and eight at Matamoros, Mexican resort city across the Rio Grande from Brownsville.

Clearing weather yesterday allowed telephone and telegraph company repair crews to restore communication lines put out of commission by the destructive winds which ripped and tore at the rich agricultural section from Monday night until noon Tuesday. Highways were being opened to traffic again as water standing on them slowly receded.

The storm denuded citrus groves of their ripening crop, valued at around \$6,000,000, and leveled cotton all over the fertile valley. The damage to property was expected to run into the millions.

CALIFORNIA OREGON RABBIT BREEDERS TO MEET NEXT SUNDAY

RETURN TO GOLD BASIS ADVOCATED

LEICESTER, Eng., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Eventual and cautious return to an international gold standard was advocated today by Professor J. H. Jones, of Leeds, England, noted British economist, in his presidential address before members of the economic, science and statistics section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science.

"I venture to express the belief," he said, "that restoration of the gold standard is necessary to the progress of the world."

He added, however, that he would not suggest the return be made immediately.

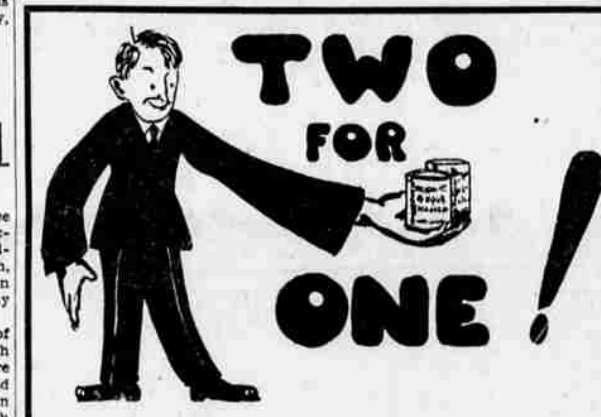
