

CRAFTY KARASICK DUMPS DEMETRAL FOR WINNING FALL

Crafty old Al Karasick won the deciding fall from Harry Demetral in their main event match at the armory last night after the Chicago Greek had bent the Russian Lion's right arm into more angles than a pretzel. Demetral took the first tumble with a ste-ove arm bar and had Karasick in a bad way several times soon after, but Al managed to clamp on a Boston crab which forced Demetral to pat the mat in 11 minutes. With the score even, Demetral went after the "Lion" hot and heavy, working on his arms in an effort to get the deciding fall.

The end came in a spectacular fashion when Demetral chased the Russian up on the ropes in a corner and Referee Les Welas attempted to make them get down and wrestle. The official was between Karasick and Demetral and Karasick made a dive over Welas' head at Demetral, the three landing in a heap on the canvas and Karasick pinning the Greek for the second fall.

Demetral substituted for Les Wolfe, who failed to appear. A 60-day suspension was decreed for Wolfe by the Medford boxing commission. In the preliminary Fireman Ray Frable found little difficulty in taking Herman Olson for two straight falls via the Sonnenberg route. Frable would allow Olson to headlock him a few times and when the latter would come in to finish the fireman suddenly snapped up from the floor with a flying tackle which laid the visiting grappler low.

STEELHEAD MOVE UP ROGUE RIVER IN AUTUMN RUN

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 8.—(Sp.)—Reports from all sections of Rogue river adjacent to Grants Pass would indicate that the fall run of steelheads is in the river and moving upstream. Fairly good catches were made over the last week-end, especially on that section between town and Alameda. Charlie Adair took a couple of six pounders below Proddy Bend, some seven or eight-pound fish were taken at Rogue Riffles, near Robertson bridge. The water between Hell's gate yielded a few good fish. Perhaps the most consistent fishing is still had on the section near We-Ark-U Inn, Pierce Riffle and Tahoma Park, clear down to the old Amest Drift dam.

With the coming of real fall weather, with cool and cloudy weather, the fishing should improve on all sections day by day and from the middle of this month until the middle of November, should see the best fly fishing of the season along this section of the Rogue. The crawfish are regaining their hard shells and bottom food of all kinds will become scarcer as the water cools.

A number of steelheads, as well as large cut-throats, have been taken with short casting rod and spinner and this method of fishing is becoming more popular as time goes on. The most popular spinners for this work are the number two Colorado, in brass, copper or nickel and copper, using a half ounce swivel casting lead.

For steelheads, the most popular and effective fly is the Royal Coachman, the old favorite with Rogue river fishermen, the Gibson Girl, Golden Breeze and other brilliant patterns with Jungle Cock wing are also very effective, and these patterns will become more and more effective as the season advances.

Fly fishing for small trout is fair along most sections and the trout are averaging larger in size than they did a month ago.

The best fishing of the season is yet to come and especially on the lower Rogue, between Grants Pass and Gold Beach.
