### BRITISHER TAKES AMERICAN TENNIS CUP WITH RALLY

By HENRY McLEMORE. United Press Staff Correspondent. FOREST HILLS, L. I., Sept. 11.—(UP)—Frederick J. Perry of England, who learned his game as a ball boy on the public courts of London, won the men's national tennis championship Sunday when he defeated Jack Crawford of Australia, 6-3, 11-13, 4-6, 6-0, 6-1.

Perry's victory gave England the American title for the first time since 1903, when Hugh L. Doherty lifted the cup, and spoiled Crawford's hope of scoring the first "grand slam" in the history of tennis. Triumph Sunday, and Crawford would have rounded out a series of conquests that included all the major tournaments in the world. Before bowing to the Englishman today his magic racket had swept aside the world's best in Australia, France and Wimbledon.

### Fishing Lines

Hints for Those Who Angle in Southern Oregon Waters

Diamond Lake, one of southern Oregon's most beautiful resorts and one favored above all others by many Medford lovers of the great outdoors, is also one of the best fishing haunts as present, according to reports brought back to Medford last night.

The lake was covered with boats yesterday and all fishermen contacted had caught the limit. They used everything in fishing—spinnets, flies and troutlines—and all got thrilling responses, and fish for dinner.

These were visitors at the lake from Washington, California and British Columbia, as well as from southern Oregon, and new and experienced fishermen were having good luck in luring the trout from the glistening waters.

The weather at the lake was all that a vacationist could ask. The smoke had cleared away yesterday, bringing clear skies to cast reflections of just an occasional cloud in the waters. The roads, one fisherman declared this morning, "were the same as usual, no worse, no better."

The number of persons going to Diamond Lake increases each summer, as does the all-summer population at the resort, where many new cabins are under construction this fall. The need for early completion of the new road is felt by a diversified population of tourists, fishermen and vacationists, ranging from "all season to week-end" visitors.

A new name was added last week to the ranks of Medford fishermen who really fish. It is that of John Eads, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Eads. He caught 48 trout in Little Butte creek while he was staying at the Eads cabin at Dead Indian Soda Springs. John said he caught the largest ones, which measured 12 inches, three miles this side of the resort.

### SALMON IN COLUMBIA PROMISE RICH SEASON

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 11.—(P)—With more than 2000 gillnetters' boats on the Columbia river here last night, as the first day of the fall fishing season drew to a close, veteran cannermen look for the biggest fall season in 20 years.

Practically every cannery in this district is to open for packing, operators announced. They included the Columbia River Packing, C. F. R. A. Union Fishermen's Cooperative, Point Adams Packing and Altona Packing canneries.
