SPOKANE REGION HOLDS NO LURE FOR CCC YOUTHS

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 11.—(AP)—The timbered west has lost its lure for some 4500 of the 6500 eastern members of the Civilian Conservation Corps, and they want to return to their homes. It was revealed at Fort George Wright, district headquarters today.

Seventy-five per cent of the eastern recruits in this region asked for discharges at the expiration of the first six-month period, while the other 2,500 have indicated willingness to reenroll. Major George Clark, commandant, said.

Clark said his report was based on a census of all but five of the 46 camps in this area.

On the other hand, workers from Washington, Idaho and Montana have re-enrolled for another six-month period almost unanimously. These youths, with the easterners remaining here, will be assigned to 12 or 14 projected winter camps in this area or transferred to other sections, possibly in the south.

Thirteen special transcontinental trains will start eastward from points in this district at intervals beginning September 15, bearing the workers whose enlistments have expired. Nine trains will go to Camp Dix, N. J.; two to Fort Hancock, Va.; one to Fort DuPont, Del., and one to Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis.

About 10,000 C. C. workers are stationed in the 46 camps, scattered throughout timbered areas in Washington, Idaho and Montana.

BRIDE, DAUGHTER SLAIN BY GROOM

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—(AP)—A bridegroom of seven weeks hanged to death his bride and her daughter by a previous marriage today.

The police, summoned to investigate a turmoil in their apartment, found Mrs. Lillian Kowalsk, 40, and her daughter, Anna Nicholas, dead of as wounds. The girl had been killed as she slept.

In the back yard the officers found Peter Kowalsk, 42, still clutching the ax. He surrendered without a fight.

Lieut. John Farrell said the man readily admitted the crime, and appeared dazed or drunk. He said he was jealous of his wife.

"Already she got around with other men," Kowalsk was quoted. "I can't stand it any longer so I kill her."
