JOHN ZIMMERLEE DIES, SHADY COVE

John Thomas Zimmerlee died at the home of his daughter, Minnie Blas, near Shady Cove, north of Eagle Point, early Thursday morning, after an illness since January of yellow jaundice. He was born in Missouri, November 28, 1862. His parents crossed the plains from Missouri in 1884, landing at Portland, Ore., where they took up a homestead in what is now East Portland. Mr. Zimmerlee moved to Jackson county in 1908, where he bought his father's farm, near where the ferry crossed the Rogue river below Trail. John Thomas Zimmerlee was married to Martha Jane Sargent at Pomeroy, Wash., November 28, 1883. Had he lived to November he would have been married 50 years.

He leaves four daughters and two sons—Mrs. Betha Abel, Talent; Mrs. Bertha Evans, Cascade Locks, Ore.; Mrs. Myrtle Myers, Yakima, Wash.; Mrs. Minnie Blas, Shady Cove; William Zimmerlee, Shady Cove; Dennis Zimmerlee, Cascade Locks; 32 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be held at the graveside in the Phoenix cemetery, Sunday at 2 p. m. Rev. John Stille officiating.
