

CAR THIEF AND GIRL HELD FOR U. S. GRAND JURY

Ernest Diefenbach, 20, of Yakima, Wash., admitted car thief, and his 17 year old girl friend, "Bita" Brown, who found an escape from officers of the law in a chase from Yakima to Medford "a big thrill," ending with arrest here early Wednesday, were taken before United States Commissioner Victor Tengwald late yesterday. Diefenbach, charged with violation of the Dyer act, was bound over to the federal grand jury with bond placed at \$1500. The girl, held as a material witness, was also bound over to the grand jury with bond placed at \$500.

The two, arrested by state and city police, waived a hearing and appeared for arraignment. They left later last night in custody of Deputy United States Marshal C. C. Wells for Portland, where they will be placed in Multnomah county jail, each having failed to produce bonds.

The grand jury is scheduled to meet in Portland today, and the filing of anticipated additional charges against Diefenbach remains with that judicial body. The admitted car thief expressed considerable concern himself yesterday regarding hints of charges of violation of the Mann act. No charges of that nature were brought by officers here, but can be preferred by the federal grand jury, should that body find evidence sufficient to warrant an indictment.

Diefenbach admitted bringing the runaway girl across the state line in the stolen car, which was just one of four, according to his written affidavit, stolen in Yakima one week ago Tuesday night. He also confessed to the robbery of a grocery store in Vancouver, Wash., and theft of two shotguns along the way south.

The girl also reviewed the events of the journey from Yakima with Diefenbach, her flight from home to live with him in a mountain camp, which she described as "swell," and signed an affidavit stating she was going to have a child.

Diefenbach's past record shows two commitments to state reformatories, one in Oregon and one in Washington.

BEER BOTTLES WANTED FOR TOMATO JUICE AT FOOD CANNING KITCHEN

"It may be 'just an old beer bottle many miles from home,' but when the Jackson county relief committee is through with it, it's going to be filled with wholesome tomato juice, to bring added sunshine into the diet of a needy child this winter. That's the story behind a call today for empty eastern beer bottles. They aren't returnable and the relief committee is anxious to get them for the Army relief kitchen, where canning operations have been in progress for a number of weeks.

People who are unable to deliver the bottles to the Army kitchen, are asked to telephone 524. The bottles will be called for wherever a number of them are to be found.

A call was also issued today for Mason jars. Anyone with an extra supply around the home, not going to be used this winter, is asked to bring them to the Army kitchen or report same to the relief committee.

Jackson county's quota of cans was 40,000. With the 17 kitchens in operation, 16,000 cans of beans have already been preserved and the tomato canning is expected to utilize at least 22,000, which will exhaust the quota. Mason jars, as additional containers, are greatly desired, to make possible preservation of a greater supply of food for the winter.

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WOCKNER AGAIN IN LAW'S CLUTCH

Warren Wockner, youthful fugitive from the law, who escaped from the deputy sheriff of Waseka, Ill., after being held here last December on charges of kidnaping, burglary and car theft, has been located again, according to information received by the state police here. He was taken into custody in Paragould, Ark., where he was traveling under the name of Robert Flesner.

He made his escape last December 10, while the deputy sheriff was transporting him from Medford to Waseka. Although he was chained to the deputy sheriff when the two went to bed in the train, when the officer awakened in the morning Wockner was gone.

During his stay in jail here, where he was held awaiting officials from Illinois, where he was wanted on the kidnaping charge, Wockner related thrilling stories of his many escapes from officials and prison bars. A slight limp in one leg was accredited to a gun wound inflicted by an officer who "almost got" him once.

BEAR TREES YOUTH WHEN CUB IS TAKEN

WHITE SALMON, Wash.—(UP)—After perching five hours in a tree to escape an irate mother bear whose cub he had tried to capture, Bill Marshall, a C. C. worker, hit upon an idea to rid himself of the belligerent. He lit a fire in the surrounding grass below his tree.

He had to summon help to put the fire out, and returning, found the cub up a tree. The party tried to capture the baby, but again mother bruin put them to rout. She was finally dispatched with a bullet and the cub made into a camp mascot.

FATHER SLAYS THIEF WHO WOUNDED SON

BOISE, Ida., Sept. 13.—(AP)—An alleged gasoline thief was shot to death on a dark street near Boise early today by an enraged father who had seen his son fall before the outlaw's gun. The dead man was Guy W. Leach, about 45. The wounded youth was Edward G. Elliott, 19.

In Leach's car was a woman who gave her name to officers as Mary King.

PIG PURCHASING TO EXCEED PLAN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Dr. A. C. Black, chief of the farm administration's hog section, said today government purchases of pigs probably would exceed the 4,000,000 maximum previously set.

The government originally said it would pay premiums on the purchase of the pigs and 1,000,000 sows. Apparently there is no intention of raising the latter figure. Edible portions of the swine will be bought by the federal relief administration.
