

CIRCUIT COURT TO OPEN MONDAY ON CIVIL LITIGATION

Action Against Howard Fearey and Insurance Company Stated for First Hearing by Judge Norton

Circuit court for Jackson county, Judge H. D. Norton, presiding, will convene next Monday, September 25, at 9:30 o'clock, and it will be the first term of court here, since last February that will not be clogged

with actions arising from the Banks-Fehl agitation. The jury list, with 19 names thereon, the last of the jury list drawn last January by the county court, has been called. The remainder of the list were excused by Judge George F. Skipton for the balance of the term. Most of the veniremen were either examined or served as juror in the trial of J. Arthur LaDau.
