TYPHOID FEVER SOURCE TRACED

Source of typhoid fever ailments, prevailing in the Jacksonville area for several weeks, resulting in one pronounced case, and three or four mild cases, known as "walking typhoid" have been traced to a private well, Dr. C. A. Drummond, county physician, said today. Samples of the well water have been sent to Salem for laboratory tests. Users of well water are urged to boil the same, as a precautionary step. The city water is also being tested. Examinations to date have failed to reveal any typhoid bacteria.

HARTLEY, HERROLD DECREE MODIFIED

A mandate of the state supreme court, directing modification of a decree in the civil suit of L. O. Herrold against C. A. Hartley, and remanding the case back to the Jackson county court "to determine the net profit of the Medford operations, and the same, if any, equally," was filed today in circuit court.

Hartley and Herrold were contractors, and part of their work included the widening of the Pacific highway between this city and Phoenix.

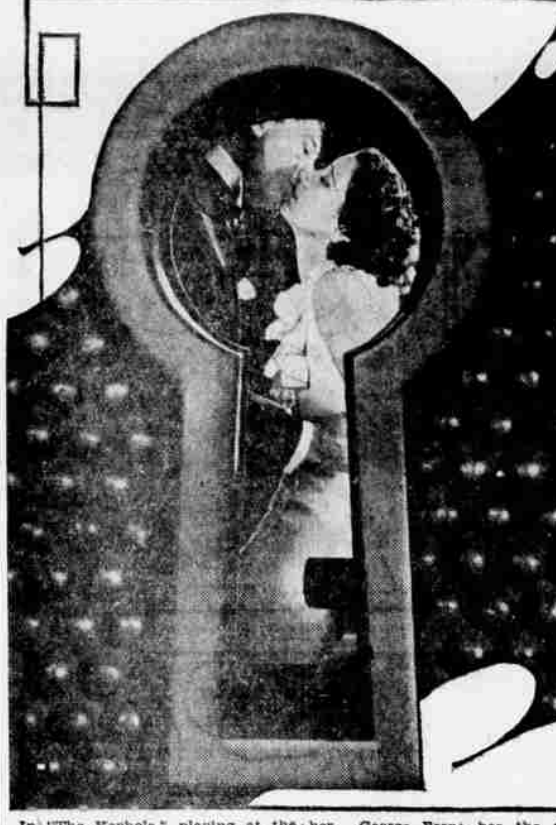

CRASH DAMAGE SUIT BROUGHT BY GIRL IS SETTLED OUT OF COURT

Settlement out of court of the damage suit of Lorain Coulan, a 15-year-old girl, against the Union Oil company of California, for \$10,000 alleged damages, sustained in an auto accident on the Pacific Highway, four miles south of Ashland, June 13, 1931, was made yesterday by stipulation. The stipulation filed says the amount was \$250. The court ordered the case dismissed. The legal move followed the selection of a jury, and the hearing of testimony yesterday. The stipulation provides that each litigant bear his own costs.

Two similar suits, filed as an outgrowth of the same auto accident, were also ordered dismissed.

The action of Peter F. Bateman against the Industrial Accident Commission, scheduled for hearing today in circuit court, was also ordered dismissed by stipulation.

Orders for dismissal of 22 civil actions, some on the court records for many months, were signed yesterday by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton.

A NEW DIETRICH IN HOLLY FILM

A new Marlene Dietrich, different than her millions of screen admirers have ever glimpsed in her previous pictures, will be seen in "The Song of Songs," her new Paramount picture, which will be featured at the reopening of the Holly theater next Saturday.

Miss Dietrich, who hitherto has appeared as a sophisticated, worldly woman, is revealed in her new production as an innocent young country girl of rare beauty, who goes to Berlin, and, jilted by a handsome young sculptor, runs the gamut of tragic experience.

She marries a rich and elderly Baron, whom she does not love, and, following their divorce, she becomes bitter and disillusioned, and a notorious woman in the gay German city's night life.

"The Song of Songs" was adapted from the literary classic of Hermann Sudermann.

Modern Youth Film On Rialto Program

"What Price Innocence?" the photoplay now playing at the Rialto, is a story of modern youth, but it is not a jazz picture.

Willard Mack, the author of the scenario, as well as its director and leading actor, for years has had the conviction that "jazz" pictures do not present a proper picture of modern youth.

"The pictures we've had in the last few years," he contends, "are all one sided. They would make us believe that all our children are gin-drinkers and do nothing but attend parties where they carry on in disgraceful manner."

The motion picture he has just finished, his first great drama after years of being the master hand of American melodrama, is the result of this point of view. "What Price Innocence?" centers around the lives of two young girls. One has been warned of the dangers and pitfalls which abound in the path of youth, while the other has been kept in ignorance by a doting mother, whose excuse is "but nothing like that would happen to our child."

There are wild parties in the picture and plenty of free talk, but it is not a "jazz" age picture presented with suggestiveness. It has been approved by many women's organizations.
