

FARM AT PRISON AIDS IN FEEDING STATE CHARGES

Eight Hogs Butchered Weekly—Herd of Forty Cows Furnishes Milk, Butter—2000 Chickens Give Eggs

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Every week is pig-killing time at the Oregon state penitentiary's model farm, near the prison.

The prison keeps an average herd of 275 hogs, which furnish hams, bacon, chops and other staples to all the state institutions in Salem. When little pigs become shoats, they are put into one of a long series of pens.

Each week, as they steadily become bigger pigs, they move one pen down the line, until finally they reach one next to a scientifically arranged and sanitary slaughter house. When they leave that one, they become pork. Eight hogs a week are butchered at the prison the year around. A meat cooling room is maintained to keep the pork at proper temperatures.

Forty Cows Give Milk

A considerable proportion of all food used in Salem institutions is produced at the prison farm, which consists of 956.35 acres and 400 acres more rented land. A herd of 40 Holstein cows provides fresh milk, with butter and other dairy products. The two bulls with the herd are among the best-bred in Oregon. One of them won the championship at the 1932 state fair.

Eggs are produced by 2,000 white leghorn hens at modern poultry houses. Young chickens are brought up each year in special brooding departments. When the hens have passed their laying prime, they make Sunday dinners for inmates of Oregon's institutions. A special department for dressing poultry is maintained. A small flock of turkeys is kept for Thanksgiving, Christmas and other special occasions.

Vegetables Raised

Twenty horses and mules perform their share of the work at the prison farm. Two great barns hold feed and furnish shelter for the livestock. A large share of vegetables and fruits used by the institutions are grown at the prison farm.

The farm was laid out principally by James Lewis, who became superintendent in 1931. It was formerly occupied by the boys' industrial school, which burned several years ago. The new boys' school is at Woodburn.

UNITED AIR LINES WILL PAY PILOTS NEAR \$7000 YEAR

Pilots of United Air Lines today received from company officials a new pay scale and general working conditions, effective October 1, providing an average annual income of approximately \$7,000 for 80 hours a month flying, or \$7,700 annually for 90 hours a month. This is the same scale as has been made effective simultaneously by American Airways, Eastern Air Transport, Transcontinental & Western Air and Westerns mentioned.

United Air Lines will pay a bonus, adding considerably to the pilots' income, until December 31, 1933, at which time the bonus payment will be reviewed.

The pilots' income under the scale just announced comes from two sources—base pay and hourly pay. Base pay is a salary paid irrespective of the number of hours flown by the pilots, and ranges from \$1,500 annually the first year to a maximum of \$3,000. It is increased at the rate of \$200 annually.

Hourly pay is based on the actual hours the pilots fly. To compensate the pilots for flying more miles as faster planes are developed, this pay is graduated upward according to the following scale:

Speed of Planes—Daylight Flight: Up to 125 m.p.h. \$4.00 per hour; Up to 140 m.p.h. \$4.20 per hour; Up to 141 m.p.h. \$4.40 per hour; Up to 155 m.p.h. \$4.60 per hour; Up to 170 m.p.h. \$4.80 per hour.

In addition, pilots are given hotel expenses when away from home and the air line pays the premium on the group insurance taken out for the pilots. A two weeks' vacation annually with full base pay is allowed.

Seniority is recognized by the increase in annual base pay. Co-pilots receive \$190 per month to start, and after six months, \$210 per month, and after a year, \$225 per month. The policy is to promote co-pilots to first pilots' positions.

In announcing the new pay scale, company officials stated that air pilots were the best paid wage earners in America, and that the new scale with its high salaries is made despite a 31 per cent reduction in air mail pay and in the face of rising operating costs. Under this scale pilots will receive approximately \$7.50 an hour.

Company officials pointed out that this year United has added 25 pilots and co-pilots as part of its expansion program of flying a large part of its mileage with passenger planes without the benefit of air mail revenue. During the period of depression it maintained the high annual income of its pilots despite salary cuts which were common in industry, in addition to giving them steady employment.

CERMAK AWARE GANGS PLANNED ASSASSINATION

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A statement that the late Mayor Anton J. Cermak knew he was marked for assassination even before Giuseppe Zan-

gari fired his fatal shot as the mayor was greeting Franklin D. Roosevelt, then president-elect, at Miami, Fla., last winter, stirred a local courtroom. It was made yesterday by former Police Sergeant Harry Miller as he testified during the trial of Harry Lang, suspended fellow officer, for the shooting of Frank Nitti, reputed "enforcer" for the Capone gang. The man appointed by the Capone gang to do the job, Miller said, was Louis "Little New York" Campagna, one of the seven men seized in a downtown office building raid during which Nitti was shot by Lang.

Several days before the raid Miller testified Mayor Cermak told him and Lang, members of a special police squad assigned by the mayor to wage a campaign against the underworld, that a plot was underway to kill him because he had planned to halt gangster operations during the world's fair. Miller said the mayor ordered the raid. "The mayor said that 'Little New York' had been imported by the syndicate to Chicago to kill him," Miller said.

TRUCK OWNERS TO FIGHT LAW

ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Members of the Douglas county chapter of the Truck Owners' and Farmers' Protective Association, at a meeting held here last night, voted to urge the local courts to suspend action in cases of arrests for improper truck licenses until after the state supreme court acts upon the appeal with regard to the state truck and bus bill. Several arrests have been made by state police officers for alleged violation of the new state law pertaining to the operation of trucks, the issues being involved in the appeal recently taken to the supreme court. Members of the local association declared last night that if the courts insist upon pressing prosecution prior to the decision by the state court defendants will go to jail rather than pay fines that may be imposed.

FEWER FAMILIES REQUIRE RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The unemployment relief rolls for Oregon contained 3,947 fewer families during the month of August than in July. It was said here today by Harry L. Hopkins, federal emergency relief administrator.

In August, 16,331 families were listed compared with 20,278 families in the previous month. The relief cost to the state in Oregon was \$268,051 in August, compared with \$347,617 in July.
