SILVER SCREEN REVIEW

With everything transpiring on both sides of "The Keyhole" exposed for inspection, each member of the large audience which greeted the romantic Warner Brothers' production at Hunt's Craterian yesterday, was placed in the position of a potential Walter Winchell. Of course their observations of life may differ, but—

Here is one who will say that beautiful Kay Francis was a perfect lady in spite of being shadowed by detectives; that she wore the most bewitching gown yet; that handsome George Brent, having limbered up somewhat in this picture, represented the kind of a defective any normal girl would welcome as a perpetual shadow; and that all the way around this is an adequately diverting show for anybody.

The broader comedy—and it's well done, too—is contributed by Olenka Farrell as the blond gold-digger with the ritzy line, and Allen Jenkins as the dumb flatfoot, "who swallows it whole."

Bill Boyd's new role as an oil driller in the Rialto's new attraction tomorrow, "Flaming Gold," is a "natural," for the virile action player is a graduate of the California oil fields, into motion pictures.
