

JARMIN OPENING NEW DRUG STORE SATURDAY MORN

North Central Location Remodeled for Modern Departmentized Store — Install Latest Equipment

"Jarmin's for Drugs"—so reads the large Neon sign above the entrance to the new drug store at 30 North Central avenue, between Newberry's and Mann's department store, which is being opened by Marc B. Jarmin on Saturday.

The building, formerly occupied by the Jackson County Building and Loan association, has been completely remodeled for the drug store, with extensive show windows having been constructed. In each window a Neon sign has been erected.

Latest designs in merchandising are being carried out by the Jarmin Drug store, with a complete departmentized system as the plan. All of the displays are open, with prices plainly marked.

See Prescriptions Filled. One of the features of the new store is the open prescription counter, where those interested may see the prescriptions filled at the desk.

Mr. Jarmin stated that a complete line of Kodak equipment will be carried, and developing and printing the pictures will be included in the services of the store. Magazines, a cigar counter, and a complete line of cosmetics will be in various departments.

Fresh Chocolates. Chocolates, kept fresh in a General Electric refrigerator will be featured by Mr. Jarmin, as well as toasted nuts, which will include the products gathered from all parts of the world.

The nuts will be kept hot in a special toaster, he said, and melted butter and salt will be put on when the nuts are purchased. An electrical heating system has been installed for this section.

Included among the products to be carried by Jarmin's are Nyal products, McKesson's merchandise and all nationally advertised merchandise.

The staff, which will assist Mr. Jarmin in his new store are Wayne Gordon, registered pharmacist from Caldwell, Ida., Leslie Coggins and Miss Myra Bush.

Mr. Jarmin has been in the drug store business since 1925, having been associated with Charles L. Woods until August, when the two mutually dissolved partnership.

FEAR POISON FROM CAULIFLOWER SPRAY

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 29.—(AP)—One hundred heads of cauliflower sprayed with sufficient poison to kill the persons eating them, were sought for confirmation by county health authorities today. The cauliflower was sold by an Inwood truck farmer to peddlers who probably will seek to market it today provided they are not located before that time.

The truck farmer, C. Nakumara, was arrested by the health department officials on a charge of improper use of poison.

BANK REOPENING PLANS HASTENED TO FREE CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Pushing the administration's plans to reopen banks of the nation and expand purchasing power, the treasury has completed details for reorganization of 375 national banks in 37 states.

The action followed the recent administration announcement that it would hasten the reopening of banks to release nearly two billions of dollars still tied up in the closed institutions.

Announcement of the approval of the reorganization plans was made by J. P. T. O'Connor, comptroller of the currency, whose department has been expanded to speed up the reopening program.

O'Connor did not say how soon the banks would be open for business, contenting himself with making public the list and saying the plans for reorganization had been approved. It is now necessary for the banks to follow the plans, as outlined, before they can receive licenses to reopen.

The banks to be reorganized include: Oregon: First National, Clatskanie; First Inland, Pendleton; First National, Salem.

FRANCO-RUSSIAN NEGOTIATION ON FOR TRADE PACT

Expansion of Business Between Two Countries Sequel to Recent Improvement in Political Relations

PARIS.—(UP)—Negotiation of a Franco-Soviet commercial treaty has been resumed in an effort to expand trade between both countries as a sequel to the recent striking improvement of their political relations.

That improvement, which still is in its initial stage, is one of the most significant events of contemporary diplomacy. During the past 12 years, the Soviet government was the staunchest ally of Germany in her struggle against the Versailles treaty; but Moscow now has availed itself of the anti-revisionist camp and is inclined to support the European status quo.

No Coincidence. It was no coincidence that Moscow and Paris began discussing a commercial accord last April, one month after Hitler established his German dictatorship. The cooler temperature of German-Soviet relations constantly has been accompanied by a corresponding warmth between France and Russia.

With its vast supply of idle capital France is alert to the opportunities of the Soviet markets, while the Bolsheviks are seeking easier credit abroad to finance their imports and provide the money for their industrial program.

Signs are not lacking that the French business world is growing more favorable to Moscow. The Soviets now are receiving 12 months' average credits in France, compared with six months in 1932; in the case of purchases of heavy machinery, Moscow even is getting terms of 18 to 21 months.

Soviet bills, discounted on the unofficial Black Bourse in Paris at the rate of 32 per cent in May, now are bearing only 16 per cent; this remarkable change is attributed to increased confidence.

Rise of Old Bonds. But the rise in value of the old bonds of Tsarist Russia, on the Paris stock exchange is an even more conspicuous economic symptom. Far from anticipating any internal political upheaval in Russia, which would justify higher prices for the reputed securities of pre-bolshevik times, the French speculators have been buying these bonds on the as-

LINDBERGH'S OFF FOR CAPITAL OF ESTONIA TODAY

MOSCOW, Sept. 29.—(AP)—After four days of sightseeing and study of sovietization, Colonel and Mrs. Chas. A. Lindbergh took off shortly before noon today for an unannounced destination, which was believed to be Tallinn, the capital of Estonia.

The Lindberghs arrived on Monday from Leningrad and afterwards were busy in a round of trips, functions in their honor, and inspection tours of schools, museums and aviation plants.

They were given a cordial sendoff by civil and air officials, who crowded the landing stage at the Dinamo Boat Club on the Moscow river.

Colonel Lindbergh said he did not intend to land again in Russia during the present tour, which has taken them on an aerial mapping flight over north Atlantic and northern European nations.

He obtained Estonian visas yesterday, and the Estonian minister and first secretary were among those bidding the couple farewell at the take-off.

It was learned today that the American aviators were guests of the official tourist agency throughout their stay in Russia.
