

Medford Defeats Weed, 27-0

GREEN SQUAD ON SHORT PRACTICE WIN FIRST GAME

New Material Shows Promise As Burgher Uses Many Substitutes — Gillsky Suffers Injury to Ankle

Medford high's inexperienced but willing football team, with but eight days' practice, defeated Weed, Calif., high, 27 to 0, Saturday afternoon on a dusty field and under a warm sun. It was the first game of the season, and one of the largest opening game crowds in many years saw the contest.

The visitors showed flashes of speed and power, and twice, profiting by Burgher's misuses took the ball into scoring territory. Some of their passes netted yardage.

Medford scored three touchdowns in the first half, and one in the fourth period, on a beautiful pass to Tommy White, who ducked a tackler and ran 25 yards for a score. It was the feature play of the afternoon.

Max Gillsky, at the start of the game made 20 yards, but strained his ankle, and was taken to the sidelines. Ghelardi then carried the ball seven yards for the first score of the game.

Fullback Gebhardt crashed through the line for the second touchdown, and Olaf Siverson, packing the ball for the first time in a regular game, ran 40 yards through a broken field for the third touchdown of the half. Tommy White booted over three extra points out of four tries.

The last of the final period was largely devoted to kicking with Tommy White's boots gaining yardage in the end zone.

Coach Burgher used a long list of substitutes. Young Bob Hinman, a long-legged end, showed up strong on defense, and snagged a couple of passes. Siverson was the other promising player of the new material, who had a day in the sun.

Weed threw passes in the final half in an effort to score, but failed, though completing several.

Carol Hayes of the Lion's club announced before the game, that organization had donated \$10 towards the purchase of new uniforms for the squad.

Last night, the Medford squad was introduced on the stage of the Craterian theater, to the audience, and were afterwards guests of Manager Hunt.

his starting line off the field and the substitutes were groggy.

In the first period, Oregon used Power plays to take the ball to the one-foot line, where Temple, Mikulak and Gee were stopped in succession and the ball went to Gonzaga. A few minutes later Oregon had advanced to the four-yard line, but a terrific tackle made Mikulak fumble, and Gonzaga recovered. The second period saw much of the action in midfield, with Gonzaga's passes and drives.

Oregon was forced to punt early in the third period, but soon regained the ball and the first scoring advance started in midfield. Temple started the drive and Gee and Mikulak alternated with him to carry the ball, each drive earning from 5 to 10 yards. Temple was stopped on the two-foot line, and Mikulak went over. Milligan was brought from the sidelines to convert with a placekick.

Robbitt and Gee, moving behind perfect interference and through wide holes, carried the attack in the third period, with Robbitt, sub for Mikulak, scoring the second touchdown. The drive started when Pozzo, Oregon end, intercepted a pass and ran back to the 19-yard line. Milligan again converted.

Defensively, Oregon had little difficulty in blocking Gonzaga's passes, and in stopping line drives.

POWERFUL COUGAR LOYOLA HUSTLES CREW MAUL P. S. U. TROJANS TO WIN

PULLMAN, Wash., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Washington State's Cougars showed power in every department of the game and romped over the light College of Puget Sound eleven, 56 to 0, in their non-conference game here today.

Coach O. E. Hollingsbery paraded his entire squad against the coast aggregation, which came here doped to make the Cougars extend themselves for more than a three-touchdown victory.

Three minutes after the game started, Stan Colburn, veteran halfback, skirted around end to score. In the opening play of the second period, Colburn plunged through the line for a five-yard gain and the second touchdown. Christofferson, a sophomore halfback, rambled around end for 13 yards for another score as the half ended.

With the second half only five plays old, Sibella intercepted a pass and ran 62 yards for a touchdown. It was the most spectacular play of the game. Phil Sarbo, sub for Magness at quarter, made two grand runs for 35 and 38 yards, but both were annulled by penalties. To make up for it, Sarbo hurled a pass to Kelly that was good for 78 yards. Christofferson started from the two-yard line and scored.

In the fourth period Washington State scored three times, the last time on a pass intercepted by Hal Bunker, substitute guard.

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Sept. 30.—(AP)—It took the University of Southern California gridiron giants almost three periods to get started today before they could crush Loyola university, 18 to 0 for their third straight victory.

Sixty-five thousand persons saw Coach Tom Lieb's Lions stubbornly fight off the powerful Trojans until late in the third quarter when Troy's offense started moving.

A clipping penalty which gave Coach Howard Jones' eleven the ball on the one-yard line marked the turning point of the contest. Three times Loyola turned the wanted Trojan attack back, but on the fourth down Homer Griffith dove over the line to score.

Less than a dozen plays later Griffith fired a long looping pass to Gordon Clark from his own 43-yard line and the Southern California halfback ran 30 yards to score again.

With victory assured, Coach Jones rushed in the reserves, who had spent most of the afternoon on the bench because of the stern opposition but Loyola had lost its strength.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 30.—(AP)—A promising Minnesota football team pried the lid off the 1933 season today with a 10-to-6 triumph over South Dakota State. Some 20,000 fans saw Coach Bernie Bierman experiment with varsity, reserves and second stringers in the non-conference tussle.

In the recent Southern Oregon championship, he tied George Roberts on the 18th hole and lost the 18th, he then tied young Hamilton of Grants Pass in the consolation on the 18th and again lost the 19th. As far as arid golf records show he is already close to the title.

Shortly after the second period opened the Bears drew first blood, Arleigh Williams, left half, going over for the count, after Joe Verducc, quarterback, had returned a punt from middle field to the Aggie 10.
