OREGON BABY STATE DECLARES PROFESSOR

PORTLAND, Ore.—(UP)—Oregon is comparatively a "baby" state—its mountains are only 30,000,000 to 100,000,000 years old for the most part, according to Dr. E. S. Larson, Professor of Petrography at Harvard university.

The Cascade Mountains, major range in the state, are a series of volcanoes built up within the last 100,000,000 years, he declared, while the flat, sagebrush covered eastern section is volcanic material that oozed out of fissures even since that time.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY IN IDAHO HOME

JEROME, Idaho, Sept. 30.—(P)—Evidently angered by a contemplated divorce suit against him, Glenn Koger, 45, a farmer, shot his wife and step-daughter to death this afternoon and then committed suicide.

Before taking his own life, he shot an eight year old child of his step-daughter through the hand while two other children cowered in terror.

Coming three miles to Jerome from his farm in the Barrymore section to the south, Koger entered the home of Mrs. August Jacobson, 30, a daughter of his wife by a former marriage. There his wife had been living since she left her husband's home Wednesday.

Using a pistol, Koger shot his wife, then her daughter, and finally wounded the little girl, Ariene, 8, in the hand. Two other of Mrs. Jacobson's children, boys aged 10 and 12, escaped after the shooting started.

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CHINESE BEER MUG FOR HARD DRINKER

WASHINGTON (UP)—The ancient Chinese beer mug (mu kuang), which held almost four quarts, may have been the horn of the Gaur or deladang instead of the rhinoceros as previously claimed, Smithsonian archeologists reported.

Carl W. Bishop, archeologist of the Freer Gallery of the Smithsonian, who recently made a study of ancient Chinese uses for the rhinoceros, explains that no horn of any of the Asian varieties of this animal could have contained seven sheng, as reported in early records. The gaur and deladang are the largest of the cattle family.

"The ancient Chinese," Bishop added, "drank enormous quantities of beer made from rice and millet and seven sheng may have been only a fair portion for a veteran drinker."

Although disclaiming the rhinoceros mug theory, Bishop said the ancient Chinese tortured political prisoners by wrapping them in the hide of a freshly killed rhinoceros. As the hide dried, he explained, it contracted slowly and crushed the victim.

WASHINGTON HEAD TO STAY FOR YEAR

SEATTLE, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Hugo Winthenwerder, acting president of the University of Washington, will remain in that position during the coming year, President Lewis B. Schwellenbach of the board of regents announced tonight.

After a session which had lasted through part of the afternoon and into the evening, Schwellenbach said that the regents felt that Mr. Winthenwerder had "demonstrated his ability" to guide the affairs of the institution through the coming year.

"We have not yet succeeded in securing a man of the high calibre we have decided upon for the new president," he added.

FARM AIDES TO DEMAND CHANGES IN PRICE CODES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Modifications of the price fixing provisions of the retail code will be demanded of the NRA by the farm administration unless they are eliminated or changed substantially by Hugh S. Johnson.

This was disclosed tonight by a high authority in the farm administration, which already has stated that rejections minimum markup provisions of a code for the food and grocery branch of the retail industry. This branch is subject to the jurisdiction of the farm unit and a hearing on its code has been set for October 9.

The basis for the farm administration's protest will be the recent tendency of prices farmers pay out to distance prices received by farmers. This tendency has been so marked in the last 30 days that government figures show farm purchasing power has decreased rather than increased, compared with the pre-war period 1909-1914.

The retail code before the NRA affecting distribution fields outside of food and groceries, is designed to stabilize prices.

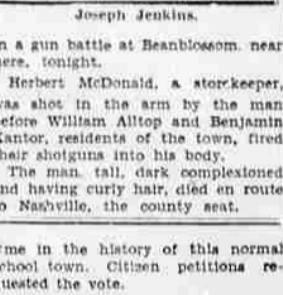
INDIANA CONVICT FUGITIVE SLAIN

NASHVILLE, Ind., Sept. 30.—(AP)—A man tentatively identified as Joseph Jenkins, one of ten convicts who escaped from Indiana state prison last Tuesday, was shot to death in a gun battle at Beaublossom near here, tonight.

Herbert McDonald, a storekeeper, was shot in the arm by the man before William Alltop and Benjamin Kantor, residents of the town, fired their shotguns into his body.

The man, tall, dark complexioned and having curly hair, died en route to Nashville, the county seat.
