If you're collecting wise-cracks, don't wait for Mae West. Sneak into what is alleged to be Connie Bennett's "Bed of Roses," RKO production, closing at the Rialto tonight, and get an earful of Pert Kelton's first edition.

As Connie's ex-reform-school mate, Pert walks right into stage center and stays there as long as she wants. The "star" of the picture can't, or doesn't do anything about it. After all, who could, with a laugh dynamo like this Kelton woman around?

When Pert's hips begin action it takes a pair of mighty good eyes to follow them. And her vocal hand-springs are turned loose — well, brother, it's no place for a deaf man.
