NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Stocks enjoyed their best rally in some time today as shorts rushed to cover in the last half hour after a leisurely upturn earlier.

Net gains of \$2 to around \$7 were numerous in all groups, but metal, alcohol and rail issues stood out. In the absence of outside news, brokers attributed the sudden rush of buying enthusiasm to technical causes, pointing out that the market had probably become oversold. Several large professional operators were reported to have switched to the buying side.

INDEPENDENT GAS DEALERS TO MEET

A communication was received by the Mail Tribune today from Edney L. Thompson, vice-president of the Independent Gas and Oil Dealers association of Oregon, Inc., announcing a meeting of independent gas and oil dealers of Medford, to be held in this city tonight. In the announcement Mr. Thompson failed to name the place of meeting and dealers interviewed here today were unable to supply that information.

Mr. Thompson announced in the letter that he would be in Medford for the session, which would be a county unit of the state association.

The association has pledged itself to obtain a cheaper gas for the motoring public and to assure a better margin of profit for the independent dealer. To this end, a set of by-laws has been adopted, corporation papers approved, and a code of fair dealing sent to the interior department at Washington, D. C. It is felt by all concerned that, unless some measure of relief is afforded, many independent dealers in Oregon will be forced out of business. The association is determined to lift this burden, the letter states.
