### Resolution No. 343.

A RESOLUTION declaring the intention of the Council to cause Main Street in the City of Medford, between Front Street and Almond Street on the South side, and Hawthorne Street on the North side, to be improved by widening the same by removing part of the sidewalk on each side thereof and constructing in place therefor a concrete curb and gutter, and by the installation thereon from Front Street to the West end of the Main Street, Bridge of an ornamental street lighting system, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property; providing for a meeting of the Council to consider protests against said improvement and providing for the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof by the Recorder.

Be It Resolved by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon:

Section 1. That it is the intention of the Council to cause Main Street in the City of Medford, between Front Street and Almond Street on the South side, and Hawthorne Street on the North side, to be improved in the manner following:

1. That portion thereof between Front Street and Riverside Avenue to be improved by removing 2 feet of sidewalk on each side of said street, and constructing a concrete curb and gutter in place thereof.

2. That portion thereof between Riverside Avenue and the West end of Main Street Bridge to be improved by removing 3 feet 9 inches from the sidewalk on each side of said street, and constructing a concrete curb and gutter in place thereof.

3. That portion thereof from the East end of Main Street Bridge to the East end of the Main Street Bridge to be improved by removing 3 inches from the sidewalk on each side of said street, and constructing a concrete curb and gutter in place thereof.

4. That portion thereof from the East end of the approach of the Main Street Bridge to the Hawthorne Street on the South side and to Hawthorne Street on the North side to be improved by removing 6 feet 10 inches from the sidewalk on each side of said street, and constructing a concrete curb and gutter in place thereof.

5. That portion thereof from Front Street to the West end of Main Street Bridge to be improved by the installation thereon of an ornamental street lighting system, all the above in accordance with plans and specifications thereon now on file in the office of the City Superintendent at the City Hall, Medford, Oregon, to which plans and specifications reference is hereby made for details and cost thereof and to assess upon each lot or part thereof adjacent to and benefited by such improvement, its proportionate share of the cost of said improvement.

Section 2. The Council will meet in the Council Chamber at the City Hall of the City of Medford, Oregon, at 7:30 p. m. at which time and place the owners of said adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said Council and cause, if any, why said improvement should not be constructed.

### Airway Beacons to Operate All Night

SALEM, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Definite assurance that dusk to dawn operation of airway beacons will be restored in this state has been received from the secretary of commerce, Congressman James W. Mott said today.

### Surveys of Crater Forest Authorized

SALEM, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The state of Oregon will receive \$73,000 out of the national emergency fund for topographic surveys, C. E. Stricklin, state engineer, was informed today. The national fund set aside for the geological survey work totaled \$2,400,000.

The money will be used as follows: Battam-Cascadia national forest \$33,000; Crater Lake national forest topography, \$20,000, and river utilization surveys, \$20,000.
