

GIRL DIES FROM FALL OFF PATH AT CRATER PARK

Miss Gillette, 26, of Longview, Wash., died in a Klamath Falls hospital Monday afternoon as the result of an accident at Crater lake last Wednesday when she fell from a narrow path to the rim road 30 feet below. Miss Gillette, who was time-keeper for Homer G. Johnson, contractor, whose crew is resurfacing the rim road on the west side of the lake near Hillman Peak, was walking from the cook house to the office tent when she thought she heard someone call her name. She turned her head, but kept on walking and slipped from the pathway, crashing headlong down the steep bank. She was picked up, unconscious, by a truck driver who saw her fall, and taken to her tent. Although the girl's injuries were not believed serious at first, later symptoms of a severe brain concussion caused her removal to Klamath Falls on Saturday where an operation was determined upon in an effort to relieve pressure on the brain. Death of Miss Gillette marks the first fatality in road construction at the lake, it is said.

MOTOR MECHANICS NEEDED IN ARMY

Young men interested in gaining a knowledge of motor mechanics, both aviation and heavy duty tractor engines, will be pleased with Major Paul Hathway's announcement that the U. S. army recruiting station, located at 224 new postoffice building, Portland, Oregon, is taking applications for enlistment in branches of the army where such training may be had. A very limited number of vacancies are available in the air corps, and a similarly limited number of vacancies exist in a motorized field artillery unit at Fort Lewis, Washington. Major Hathway also stated that enlistments could be made for Letterman General Hospital, San Francisco, California, where training in clinical laboratory work, X-ray, surgery, dentistry and other technical work may be had. In addition to those vacancies mentioned, enlistments may still be made in coast artillery corps, infantry and horse drawn field artillery. An enlistment in any of these branches of service may easily become the means of learning a trade that will be of lasting value upon return to civil life.

TWO DIE FROM CRASH INJURIES

PORTLAND, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Automobile accidents took two lives here Monday. Mrs. William L. Cartmill, 65, died in a hospital last night from injuries suffered a few hours earlier when she was struck by a car while crossing a street. A companion, Dorcas Baker, who was with her, was struck by the same car and was in a critical condition. H. G. Olson, driver of the car, said the women stepped from behind a parked automobile directly in the path of his machine. He was not held. Tom McMahon, 45, bridge attendant, died early yesterday, a short time after he had been struck by a hit-and-run driver who has not been captured.

ROSEBURG PLANS OWN LIGHT PLANT

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 4.—(AP)—An amendment to the charter of the city of Roseburg, providing authority for the city council to negotiate for the construction, purchase or condemnation of a plant for the generation and distribution of electricity, is to be submitted to the voters of the city at a special election to be held November 20. The council, which has long been investigating the matter of a municipally owned power plant, last night adopted the ordinance providing for the election. A second vote will be required in the event the amendment is adopted, before any final contract for a power plant can be signed and bonds issued.
