

BLUE BOOK READY FOR DISTRIBUTION BY SECY. HAL HOSS

Official Gazetteer and Compendium of Facts Off the Press — Governor Writes on Recreation Opportunity

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—The Oregon Blue Book, biennial "official gazetteer and compendium of facts and figures concerning the state and federal government," is off the press and ready for distribution.

The book was edited by Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss, a former newspaperman, and is the largest and most complete edition yet issued. A feature of this year's book is a series of articles on resources of Oregon, written by state officials and other authorities.

Meier Writes Article.
"Oregon has seen a well deserved reputation as an ideal summer playground," writes Governor Julius L. Meier in an article entitled "Oregon, An Empire of Progress and Opportunity."

"We have within our borders an infinite variety of recreational resources—a rugged and beautiful seashore, snow-capped peaks, blue lakes in upland meadows, cool green forests, crystal clear mountain streams and great rivers. Fishing, hunting, golfing, winter sports—these are not rich men's pleasures in Oregon, but are within the easy reach of all.

"Over excellent highway one can motor with comfort and pleasure to every part of the state, and the Columbia River and Coast highways cannot be excelled for magnificent scenery.

Products Diversified.
"We have a diversity of farm products which safeguards us against the ills of agricultural communities confined to limited crops. Oregon fruit and vegetables, canned and fresh, Oregon wool, Oregon flax and hops, Columbia river salmon, wheat from eastern Oregon plains and cattle from eastern Oregon ranges, Oregon dairy products and poultry and a multitude of other crops from Oregon farms and fields go to all the markets of the world.

"From an industrial standpoint we are just beginning to take the place that is rightfully ours by reason of abundant and accessible raw material, equipped with abundant water power. Oregon possesses one-sixth of the potential hydro-electric power of the nation, now on the eve of development, which means immeasurable industrial opportunities for the future.

Land of Promise.
"The pioneers of the covered wagon found Oregon a land of promise. For the resourceful, the enterprising and ambitious, the rich opportunities which called the pioneers still wait at the end of the Oregon trail."

Other special articles appearing in the blue book include: "Oregon's highway system," by R. E. Baldock, state highway engineer; "Oregon Geography and Resources," by Dr. James H. Gilbert and Dr. Warren D. Smith, University of Oregon; "Oregon's Timber Resources," by L. W. Cronmiller, state forester; "Oregon's Outstanding Geological Features," by Dr. Warren D. Smith; "Oregon's Wild Life," Ernest L. Crockett, assistant supervisor of state game commission; "Oregon Writers of Today," Harriet O. Long, state librarian; "Facts of Early Oregon History," Dr. John B. Horner, late professor of history at Oregon State college; "Oregon Military Forces," Capt. Willis E. Vincent, and "Oregon's Military Record," by Brigadier General Thomas E. Riley.

Data on Elections.
Statistics included in the volume are abstract by counties of the general elections of 1932 and of the special election July 21, 1933. An account of the constitutional convention which ratified repeal of the 18th amendment is also included.

The national and state constitutions, declaration of independence, list of all national and state officials, and major Oregon officials since formation of the state are among the material in the book.

The book is distributed free to schools, state, county and city officers. A charge of 25 cents each is made for copies distributed to the public.

SALEM CORPS TO HANG UP BUGLES

SALEM, Oct. 6.—(UP)—Disbandment of the Salem American Legion drum corps, ex-national champion, will be effected at an early meeting of Capital post executive committee. It was learned here today.

The outcome of the competition in Chicago where Salem was disqualified has no bearing on the discontinuance. The corps had agreed before departure to disband after the trip "win, lose or draw." It was learned that tentative plans were under way to dispose of uniforms and equipment to other corps.

The corps may retain its identity until after Armistice day.

WOULD RELIEVE CROWDED INSANE

SALEM, Oct. 6.—(UP)—Employment of a social worker to be placed in the field to permit parole of insane patients to homes and relieve the increasing crowded conditions in the two state hospitals was authorized by

the state board of control here today. Selection of the worker was left to Mrs. W. D. McNary and R. E. Lee Steiner, heads of the Eastern Oregon and State Insane hospitals.

Other steps looking toward relief of the congestion were emphasized by

Dr. McNary, who urged another hospital building in Multnomah county as well as a psychopathic ward. He declared there were now 1280 patients at Pendleton and more than 2200 at Salem, taxing the extreme maximum capacity of the two institutions.
