

PRIMITIVE MAN'S TRACE SOUGHT IN MONTANA REGION

Perfect Geologic Record Is Found of Progress Change From Early Days, But No Sign of Man Yet Seen

By WENDELL BURCH (United Press Staff Correspondent.) BUTTE, Mont. — There's a great mystery abroad in Montana—a missing character puzzle that dates back several million years, but nevertheless is more thrilling to scientific minds than the newest detective thriller.

The mystery may be summed up in a single question: "What, if anything, happened to primitive man in Montana?"

Investigators have no idea what sort of chap primitive man in Montana might have been, for the past has furnished no description or clue to his appearance.

In Montana, northern Wyoming and the Canadian province of Alberta a perfect geologic record of progress and change from the earliest times is available. Conditions during the age of reptiles, before that age, and later, when marine life and mammals made their appearance, and finally through the periods of glaciers down to modern times may be studied from the exposed rocks and fossils discovered.

Somewhere along the line primitive man logically might have put in his appearance. The most painstaking research, however, has failed to reveal a single clue to his presence.

Dinosaur finds have been numerous in Montana, Wyoming and Alberta. In 1930 a group of Princeton scientists found fragments of a dinosaur egg, the second ever unearthed. Roy Chapman Andrews found the only other known dinosaur egg in the Gobi desert in 1923.

Remarkably well preserved skeletons of the tyrannosaurus rex, king of all dinosaurs, the camptosaurus and hoplitosaurus have been dug up in Montana.

Dinosaurs lived 80,000,000 to 100,000,000 years ago, according to accepted estimates. From Bearfoot Butte, near the summit of the Bearfoot mountains of southern Montana, investigators this summer took the first two complete skeletons of armored fish ever found. These fish, and a type known as lung fish, also found in the butte, were among the earliest vertebrates.

The next age in mammalian development has been traced from finds near Cody, Wyo., south of the Bearfoot mountains. Here remains of the ehippus, or four-toed horse, and of ancient tapira have been unearthed. A corresponding Montana find was that of the skull of a sabre-toothed tiger in a cave near Bowler, Mont.

From here on the fossil and geologic record becomes confused. Some time later glaciers covered all of Montana, and covered all of Alberta, scientists believe. Many experts hold there simply was no human life in the area before or during the glacial period, and that man first entered the region from Asia, by way of the Bering Straits.

The meeting was the first held by dealers of the two counties to effect an association.

STATE BUSINESS MOVING AT FAST SPEED IN NATION

Oregon to Have Three Legislature Sessions Is Prospected — Taxation, Relief, Liquor Control Take Time

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—Private business may be operating on a restricted basis in the United States this year, but state business is having its greatest boom in history.

With a special and regular session completed, and another special session impending, the Oregon legislature has shattered all records for duration this year. Oregon's record, however, is far down the list when compared to other states.

Forty-three of the 48 states had regular legislative sessions this year, a survey shows. Special sessions were held in 16 states, are at present being held in three other states, and are to be called in seven states.

Many Issues. Taxation, relief, liquor control and beer have been subjects considered at nearly all the legislatures called into special sessions. Oregon's regular session of 60 days was one of the longest in the history of the state. It was preceded by a special five-day session. Only three legislatures — Wyoming, Georgia and Idaho — were on duty shorter periods than Oregon's. Wyoming lawmakers sat 40 days. Sessions lasted 59 days in Georgia and Idaho. Sixty-day sessions were also held in Arkansas, Florida, New Mexico, South Dakota, Utah and Washington.

Massachusetts legislature, which sat for 200 days, was the longest this year. The Wisconsin lawmakers were on the job 197 days. Illinois 179, Michigan 166, New Hampshire 164, Connecticut 155.

Utah, Arizona, in addition to regular sessions, each has already had two special legislatures this year. Utah had special sessions lasting 7 and 24 days, in addition to the 60-day regular term. Arizona's regular legislature lasted 65 days, the special ones one and 23 days.

Other states which have had or are having special meetings of lawmakers are: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Idaho, New York, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio and Texas.

Longest was Alabama's, lasting 74 days. Special legislatures are expected to meet this fall in Iowa, Illinois, Kansas, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, Oregon and Pennsylvania.

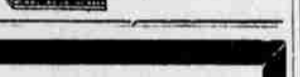
