SHASTA-CASCADE ASSOCIATION TO MEET HERE NEXT

The most enthusiastic gathering in the history of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association was reported here today by A. H. Banwell, manager of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, upon his return from Redding, Cal. Jackson county had the largest representation at the meeting, with 15 attending from Medford and nine from Ashland.

The next convention of the association will be held in Medford, this city finally winning out over Klamath Falls in exciting competition, waged by the two cities to gain the 1934 meeting.

Medford also won endorsement of the Williams Creek road construction, presented by Paul Rynning, county engineer; the Little Butte creek road, presented by Hamilton Patton; the Siskiyou project and the program to preserve the forest line of the Crater Lake highway.

Jackson county is represented by W. A. Gates as director on the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland board and one of the most interesting contributions to the convention program was the description given Mr. Gates' speech on hydrogeophysics of the lava bed.

Other Medford representatives winning prominent places in the personnel of the association were: C. L. MacDonald, council chairman; C. Glenn Smith, chairman of the recreation group and Mr. Banwell, chairman of the resolution committee.
