NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(UP)—Henry L. Mencken, noted Baltimore editor and author, told the United States last night that he is resigning as editor of the monthly magazine, "The American Mercury," which he has guided for the last nine years. Mencken said that he is retiring after 20 years of magazine editing to devote his time to his own writings and to travel. He will retain his position as an unofficial advisory editor on the Baltimore Evening Sun, to which he contributes frequently. "I'll probably do more newspaper writing than I've done in some years," Mencken said tonight.

1 cup rice uncooked 1 cup mushrooms cooked 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese 3 tablespoons olive oil 3 tablespoons tomato sauce 4 or 5 cups salt and pepper soup stock
Heat oil in frying pan, brown onion slightly in it and add rice. Fry to a golden brown, then add broth a little at a time, stirring constantly. Add mushrooms and cook until tender. Just before removing from fire add tomato sauce, seasonings and cheese. Sprinkle with additional cheese. Serves six to eight.
