

### TROJAN, COUGAR TILT FEATURES SATURDAY BILL

So. California Sees Distinct Threat in Washingtons— O. S. C. Plays Gonzaga— Oregon Meets Columbia

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Unbeaten since they fell before St. Mary's early in the season of 1931, the University of Southern California Trojans, football champions of the Pacific Coast conference, face their first serious threat of 1933 when they meet the Washington State College Cougars at Los Angeles tomorrow.

This contest, rated a stiff test of the Trojans' title prospects this year, is the lone conference clash of the week-end, six other member teams will face non-conference opposition and two, the University of Montana and the University of Washington, will remain idle.

Trojans Favored. Known strength in every regular position, plus a great array of potential man-power in reserve, has established the Trojans as favorites to inaugurate their conference season with a win. Captain Ford Palmer at end, Aaron Rosenberg at guard, Homer Griffith at fullback and "Cotton" Warburton at quarterback are stars who will lead Coach Howard Jones' men to battle.

The University of California will square off against St. Mary's at Berkeley tomorrow in a traditional battle which holds the interest of San Francisco bay region fans.

Broncos Meet Cards. Another bay region contest will bring the Santa Clara Broncos and the Stanford University Cardinals together in Stanford stadium. Both teams have wins this season over first rate opposition, Santa Clara having beaten California, 7 to 0, and Stanford having taken the measure of the University of California at Los Angeles, 3 to 0. The game is rated a toss-up.

In an after-dark contest at Los Angeles tonight, the U. C. L. A. Bruins will tackle the University of Utah in what they hope will be a breather after last week's hard tussle with Stanford. The Bruins are favored.

O. S. C. Has Tough 'A's. Or the northern Oregon State college, under its new coach, Lon Stiner, faces the toughest assignment in meeting the Bulldogs of Gonzaga. The game will furnish a yardstick to measure conference strength, for the Bulldogs have been beaten by the University of Oregon and the University of Washington already this year.

Completing the program for conference teams, Oregon will face Columbia, and the University of Idaho will take the field against Whitman college, in a pair of games rated as "easy" for the circuit members.

### SONS FACE HARD GAME SATURDAY WITH PACIFIC 'U'

Pacific University arrived today for their annual clash with the SONS Saturday at Ashland. The Sons won last year at Medford, 20-0, but that was against a crippled and demoralized Badger team. This year Anse Cornell, new Pacific coach, brings the greatest array of football talent ever assembled at the northern

school—a full lineup of veterans—every one a letterman—will start the game. That is not all. They have seven more veterans in reserve—is in all.

Howard Hobson's Sons will use all its veterans—seven—in the starting lineup if Anderson's foot is in condition. Otherwise McLain, Eugene recruit, will start. The teams are even in weight and both exceptionally fast. Killits, McKee, Ruonich and McKee in the Pacific backfield are all sprinters as well as veterans, as is Parberry at right end.

Elmer Brown, ex-Oregon star, Lancaster and Bradford are speed merchants for the SONS. Both Cutchfield and Corrigan are triple threat artists for Pacific as are Lancaster and Brown for Sons. Cutchfield once played under Hobson in Washington and the Sons coach knows only too well his ability. It is his fourth year as regu-

lar fullback at Pacific—the outstanding plunger in the Northwest Conference.

Coach Hobson today refused to predict anything but a hard ball game, with the team getting the breaks the probable winner. "They will be as tough as Monmouth. They beat Columbia last week and with a bagful of tricks, along with hard football. We have worked hard the last two weeks and should give them a close game. It should be a real thriller."

The clash is scheduled for 2 p. m. Saturday at the Ashland high school field, Ashland.
