Arrested—A man was arrested Saturday morning in an effort to obtain trial delay, twice asked for continuance, filed a demurrer claiming it was not sufficiently definite as to the nature of the crime, asked for a trial by the judge without a jury, and a separate trial. All were denied.

"You don't mean to say that you are going to ask for a separate trial on a misdemeanor," the court asked defendant's counsel.

The court said that under the law, in misdemeanors, separate trials were discretionary with the court, and denied the plea.

Attorney W. E. Phipps for the defense, selected after the court had ruled there would be no further delay, questioned jury's relative to service on the ballot, theft cases, membership in the "congress" or the "committee of 100"; if they had publicly denounced the activities, or expressed an opinion on the case, if they read the newspapers, and if they knew O. C. Boggs.

The state continued its questions to the ability of the jurors to give both sides a fair and impartial trial.
