

ROTARY FEATURES INFLATION FORUM LED BY STEWARD

Members of the Medford Rotary club again turned their attention to the increasingly important and timely question of inflation at their weekly luncheon today at the Hotel Medford.

Hamilton Patton, chairman of the program committee, again turned the meeting over to C. T. Steward who presided over a forum discussion of the various phases of inflation.

After a brief review of former inflation and deflation periods, Steward presented a formula of authoritative economists in which price times its velocity equals quantity of money times its velocity.

The speaker called the Rotarians' attention to the initial benefits of inflation, but stressed the necessity of proper control.

Hamilton Patton, Orin Schenck, George Henselman, Glen Smith and other Rotarians participated in the round-table discussion which followed.

Steward's interesting talk. Numerous charts were used by the speaker to clarify and emphasize points in the forum session.

SECRET PRICES ON FOODSTUFFS ROOT OF EVILS

Henry King, New York, representing the National American Grocers association, and P. H. Massmann, Chicago, representing organizations of chain stores, both said the open price provisions would make it possible for retailers of foods to be protected against advantages of their competitors.

Hector Lazo, Washington, spokesman for the National Association of Retail Grocers, contended the existing system with no prohibitions against secret prices had had effects on the farmer, the consumer and the trade, and prevents stabilization.

Conditions in the trade have reached such a pass that foodstuffs are being sold in many instances on every single appeal except that of wholesomeness and quality," Lazo said.

The hearing proceeded today without a ruling from the farm administration as to whether it will grant the request of numerous manufacturers of food products to be exempted from provisions of the code which, in addition to requiring open prices by manufacturers and wholesalers, would prescribe minimum markups in prices by wholesalers and retailers.
