

Sally Rand Dons Flannel Unmentionables to Spare Blushes of New Yorkers

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(UP)—Sally Rand, who achieved nation-wide fame as the nude fan dancer of the Century of Progress exposition, performed her dance on the stage at the Paramount theater last night, clad in a suit of long flannel underwear.
 Miss Rand encased her now famous torso in the flannels after the theater had been warned by the city license commissioner that its license would be revoked unless the fan dancer wore more clothing.
 Earlier the blonde dancer had announced defiantly that she would wear flannel drawers if the city persisted in "persecuting" her.
 At the same time she cast grave doubts on the artistic sense of her chief critic, License Commissioner Sidney S. Levine, who ordered that she wear more clothing beneath her swishing ostrich plumes.
 Obeying the edict, Sally danced onto the stage, manipulating her fans with such dexterity that no one in the audience knew she was wearing anything. She continued through the entire dance without exposing her costume.
 Then, with dramatic suddenness, she stood before the audience and brought the fans away from her body with a swish. "The audience gasped, sat stupefied, then burst into roars of laughter."



PIONEER ESTATES UP FOR PROBATE

Steps for administration of the estates of two southern Oregon pioneers have been taken in probate court the past week.
 Michael F. Hanley, Jr., was yesterday named administrator of the estate of the late Michael F. Hanley, Sr., who left no will. The widow waived the right. The estate value of personal property is estimated at \$3,800 and is exclusively of land holdings. John S. Orth of Fort Klamath, Thomas L. Farlow of Lake Creek and William T. Grieve of Prospect—longtime friends of the deceased—are named as appraisers.
 State Senator George W. Dunn of Ashland, a son, is named administrator of the estate of Mary M. Dunn, southern Oregon pioneer, who recently passed away at the age of 97 years. Three daughters—Mrs. Elizabeth Van Sant of Portland, Mrs. Ottilia Caldwell of Eugene, and Mrs. Ella D. Rice of Portland and Senator Dunn are listed as the heirs. There was no will.
 The personal property estimate is \$20,000. Thomas H. Simpson, J. W. McCoy and W. H. McArthur, all residents of Ashland, are listed as appraisers of the estate.

CIVIL CASE TAKES COURT ATTENTION

The first of the civil suits, filed for the southern Oregon term of the federal court, Federal Judge James A. Fee presiding, was underway today.
 It was the action of B. R. Warren against the Forest Lumber company of Klamath county for \$75,000 alleged damages. The suit grows out of an accident at the mill of the defendants, wherein it is claimed that Warren sustained permanent injuries to his legs from scalding steam.
 Warren is represented by Lord & Moulton of Portland; the defendant by Nicholas Jauregui and Charles R. Spackman, Jr., of Portland.
