

CLOSED MARKETS HONOR COLUMBUS

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—An ocean voyage made centuries ago was the inspiration for holiday observance in many parts of the nation today.

It was the journey on which Christopher Columbus, obscure ocean seafarer, sailed his way to immortal fame as the discoverer of a new continent.

Today—the 41st anniversary of the discovery of America—was marked by celebrations and festivals principally by Italian societies honoring their worthy ancestor. Knights of Columbus also joined in the observance.

The day was a bank holiday in some states and financial markets in some of the larger trading centers were closed, including the New York stock exchange.

NEW EGG GRADING RULE ANNOUNCED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The new grade of eggs named here by the Pacific Co-ops by the addition of the "Special Extra" instead of the "extra," practically makes the entire coast trade uniform in this regard.

The new setup of grades was unexpected and the price changes, some of them being lowered, were not in line with the idea of the trade.

Trading in the butter market was rather dull with practically an entire absence of speculative interest. Prices were unchanged for cubes during the late session but open market sales were occasionally 1/2c less.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY OATS CROP RECORD

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The largest crop in the Willamette valley within many years, despite the general freezing out of the winter planting, was predicted by dealers here today. The oats market has shown liberal inquires from the east. Last year's Oregon oat crop totaled 6,202,000 bushels. This year's showing, according to the latest estimate, is around 8,636,000 bushels, about 90 per cent of which will come from the Willamette valley. Spring planting was resorted to with unusually heavy yields.

SKATER, 47, TRIES MARATHON MARK

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 12.—(AP)—W. W. Miller, 74, at 1:25 this morning claimed he tied the reputed world's continuous roller skating record of 160 hours and 25 minutes. He continued skating in a Tacoma rink toward a new 200-hour record he has set for himself. He has not removed his skates since the start last Saturday night at 9 and has been continuously on his feet with only the briefest intervals off the floor.

Under auspices of the National Skating association, Miller was started off on the grueling endurance record attempt by Mayor M. G. Tennent and has since been under the constant surveillance of one or another of a committee named by the mayor.

HAMAS KNOCKS OUT MILLER IN FOURTH

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Steve Hamas, the Pacific N. J. slugger, gave the guessers something to think about today.

The former Penn State athlete blasted Benny Miller, local favorite, into defeat last night before 9000 persons with a resounding right uppercut which abruptly ended a scheduled 10-round bout after a minute and a half of battling in the fourth round.

In the brief bout Miller showed marked superiority as a boxer, scoring frequently with his left, but his vanity made him too cock-sure as he attempted to slug it out.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Oregon State college football team today started on its first and only invasion of California this season, cheered on by the most enthusiastic pep rally seen here in years.

PLAN WATERFOWL REFUGE SURVEYS

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Survey of waterfowl refuges in Oregon which never before have had proper designations and improvement of conditions in the Upper Klamath lake and Arch Rock refuges, will be undertaken soon by the United States biological survey.

Paul G. Redington, chief of the bureau, was here today for his annual visit to the Pacific northwest. He said a major part of the \$6,000 allotted to Oregon under the national recovery act for biological work will be spent in this manner. "Oregon's share of the appropriation will be expended where we feel it will do the most good," he said. "We hope to survey and designate some of the refuges in the areas where they are most needed."

MARTIAL LAW IN MINE DISORDERS

SULLIVAN, Ind., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Indiana national guardsmen established virtual martial law in Sullivan county today.

After three explosions had shaken the city early this morning Brigadier General D. Wray Deppes conferred with local officials and then issued regulations forbidding any assemblage except on express permission from the military authorities.

The regulations also directed the closing of all business houses, theaters, restaurants and other public places at 9 p. m. and established a 10 p. m. curfew.
