HIGHWAY WORK BIDS ARE ASKED

SALEM, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Call for bids on 14 jobs involving improvement or construction of 81 miles of highways and six bridges in 11 counties in Oregon were issued by the state highway department today. Awards will be made at the meeting in Portland, October 25. The total cost will be approximately \$100,000.

The largest job will be surfacing about 25 miles of the Scottsbluff-Bridge section of the Umpqua highway in Douglas county. All are national recovery projects.

The jobs to be awarded include: Jackson county—resurfacing rock production project on Grassy Springs highway, furnish approximately 6000 cubic yards crushed rock or crushed gravel in stock piles.
