PHEASANT SEASON OPEN SUNDAY FOR SEVENTEEN DAYS

With the opening of the pheasant season Sunday morning a half hour before sunrise, which will be 5:45 o'clock, the game division of the state police today reminded valley hunters that the area near Shady Cove auto camp, where the refuge is located, will not be open to hunters.

"No hunting" signs have been erected about that district in order that hunters might know where the boundaries are maintained. They continue to the section where the game plant is located, the officers said.

Limit for pheasants, according to the state game code, is four birds in one day, including only one hen, or eight in one week, including one hen. The same dates of October 15 to 31 are maintained for the grouse season, with the limits the same as on pheasants.

In the face of such circumstances, tomorrow's tussle can be rated as nothing but a tossup, although the potentially strongest in years and looms the more powerful of the two in an early season scrap.

Cougars Try Comeback. Orin Hollingsberg's Washington State Cougars, pushed into the background of the conference picture by their 33 to 0 defeat at the hands of the University of Southern California last Saturday, will hit the comeback trail against little Montana and are favored to balance their conference ranking with a win.

At Los Angeles, the mighty Trojans of U. S. C. attempting to run their string of straight victories to 25, will oppose the Gaels of St. Mary's. The season of the most likely to halt the triumphant march of Troy.

Their prestige distinctly reduced after their 14 to 13 defeat by the University of California last Saturday, the Gaels are no better than 1 to 3 short-enders in the southland, while bay region fans rate them a 1 to 2 shot.

Across the bay in Berkeley, Coach Bill Ingram said his rejuvenated California Bears will attempt to take the ever-dangerous San Francisco Olympic club team in stride. Far to the east, in Chicago, Stanford university, representing the Pacific coast in the first important inter-sectional battle of the season, will face Northwestern university.

RIOT BEFORE NRA OFFICE QUELLED

NEW YORK, Oct. 13. (AP) - Mounted police rode their horses through crowds of rioters today at NRA headquarters at the hotel Pennsylvania in midtown New York. Police said radicals, numbering 3500 were responsible for the disorders.

More than fifty arrests were made. Demonstrators, bearing placards and banners, were pushed back to sidewalks and police attempted to chase them out of the neighborhood.

More than 2000 strikers in the cleaning, dyeing and tailoring industry assembled at the hotel at 10:30 a. m.

NRA officials charged the demonstration was inspired by a communist faction, which refused to be taken into right wing unions following NRA mediation in a threatened strike of 25,000 workers of neighborhood shops.

Ruth Unmentioned. Lou Gehrig of the Yankees, Lefty Grove of the Athletics and Charley Gehring of the Tigers were ranked fourth, fifth and sixth. For the first time since 1927, Babe Ruth did not receive a vote or so much as honorable mention.

The selection of Foxx marks the fourth time in six years that a member of the Athletics has been chosen

for the American league honor. Mickey Cochrane in 1928 and Bob Grove in 1931 preceded the first baseman in winning recognition as the most valuable.
