

1934 BUDGET ESTIMATES—JACKSON COUNTY

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 8 Chapter 446 of the 1933 Session Laws of Oregon, notice is hereby given that the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, will meet at the Court House, in Medford, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1933, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock A. M. of said day and at the said time and place opportunity will be given for a full and complete discussion of the estimates of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year as published herewith, by any taxpayer subject to such tax levy when made in favor of or against any of the proposed tax levies herein as the County Court may deem for the best interests of Jackson County.

The County Budget Committee for Jackson County, Oregon, has prepared and submits the following: An estimate of the amount required for each department of County government, County office or County officer, each County improvement, the maintenance of each County building, structure or institution, the salary of each County officer or employee, including those whose salaries are fixed by statute, for the improvement and maintenance of public highways, roads, bridges, the construction, operation and maintenance of each public utility and redemption of outstanding warrants, the estimate of the public receipts of the County from sources other than direct taxation upon real and personal property in the County during the period for which such tax is to be levied and an estimate of the probable unapportioned and unexpended balances in the funds of the County on the last day of the current year.

One word description of Lillian Gish—featherly. They say Noel Coward fashions ribald limericks when he comes to a full stop in play-writing. Donn Byrne used to watch an hour-glass. There's a hiccuppy name, Ichabod Gupp. The dramatic critics have certainly had to scratch this summer.

But who is that hasn't? One of my favorite people—"Bugs" Baer. No one tries to imitate Roy Atwell's rib-berty-jiberty-lingual contortions. No one can.

Someone wrote me today: "Why does Bobbie Clark always have McCullough in his shows?" My answer would be: "Because Bobbie is a grand person!" I always peep in the drawn curtain cracks to see window decorators. Nobody has yet offered me brandy that wasn't Napoleon. But to be honest very few ever offered me brandy. I seem to strike most people as a lemonade man.

It was years ago and about a dozen saw it. The scene was a large hotel dining room rather late when most patrons had gone. A now celebrated American novelist strolled in quite quietly to a table alone as Col. Mann, publisher of Town Topics, a society magazine. The novelist staggered over, gave Col. Mann a heard a mild yank, and said: "That is for being such a scavenging old billy-goat." Col. Mann said nothing, but a flaming red slowly mounted and suffused his bald dome like an Italian sunset. He went to Europe next day for six months. He could not take it!

Harry Kemp, tramp poet, and Brock Pemberton, theatrical producer, were classmates at Kansas University. While their lives have been cast in different strata they never forgot the campus days. When Kemp disposed of some poem he sends a marked copy to Pemberton and Kemp always receives first night seats to Pemberton's premieres.

In 46th street a gray-haired fellow extended an old felt horror with stained band and limp, greasy crown. Suddenly he withdrew it and looked away quickly like a dog that has not made up its mind to wag his tail.

Consider sitters on one leg! Harry Lauder's one Charles Laughton, English actor, another. Among friends their left legs twist under. Lord Northcliffe sat on one leg and munched peanut brittle during conferences. England's chancellor of the exchequer, Philip Snowden, indulges the same twist. So does Col. Joseph Hartfield, international lawyer, as depicted the late Myron T. Herrick. O. yes, Marlene Dietrich sits on one—er, limb or whatever they are these days.

The dapper and dandified Henry Blossom, playwright, used to be a leisurely Broadway wanderer when it was a noble street. Stopping, he

propped himself on his cane, leaned back and expounded some theory, often flailing the air with his hands. Broadway waited for someone to kick the cane from under him. No one did.
