WET FIELD SOLE HOPE OF STATERS IN TROJAN CLASH

Power Teams To Meet At Portland Saturday - St Mary Loss and Ruling Topic for Fans.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Having squared accounts with St. Mary's Gaels through a 14-7 victory last Saturday, Southern California's Trojans swing back into the coast conference football race this weekend against Oregon State.

Cold facts and figures forecast a Southern California win over Oregon State on a neutral field at Portland. Rain or a wet field may hamper the Trojans' drive but the crushing power shown in five games at home thus far is expected to be effective in any kind of weather.

The twenty-fifth consecutive Trojan triumph since early in 1931 saw St. Mary's defense hurled back for a 88 yard drive and again for 95 yards, the second thrust being given the added impetus of a fifteen yard penalty.

While Southern California's offense was clearly superior, the eighty thousand fans were still mulling over the question of whether the fifteen yard penalty cost St. Mary's a tie. The count was 7-1 in the second quarter when Ed Gilbert, guard, came in as a substitute for St. Mary's.

He shouted a few words of encouragement to his team mates before the next play had started. The Trojans had the ball on the 23 yard line but after the 15 yard penalty for the technical violation had been exacted there were only eight yards left to goal. The second and winning touchdown was scored from this point.

Oregon state will be Southern California's second conference opposition. Two Saturdays ago, Washington State fell a 38-0 victim to the Trojan batters. Oregon State has won one conference encounter, beating Montana, 20-0. Last week the Staters defeated University of San Francisco, 12-7.

California's Bears, increasingly formidable since their opening game 7-0 loss to Santa Clara, will make their conference debut on the home field of Washington State's Cougar at Pullman.

Last Saturday they came through with an impressive 23-0 win over the strong San Francisco Olympic club eleven, powered by former college stars. The victory proved costly however, as Floyd Blower, sophomore halfback, received a couple of cracked ribs. Blower was mainly responsible for the win over St. Mary's.

In other games next Saturday, all of non-conference bearing, Washington will meet Puget Sound; University of California at Los Angeles will take on Loyola; Montana will play Montana State and Stanford faces San Francisco.

A Friday night conference game will pit Idaho against Oregon at Eugene. Oregon became the main threat of the north last Saturday by defeating Washington, 6-0.

MIKULAK SHINES AS ENTIRE SHOW IN OREGON'S WIN

SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Down, but not out, Washington began putting its football pieces together today for a long, tough season, after taking another rough gridiron punch from Oregon. The score was 6 to 0.

It's getting to be just an old Oregon custom—this business of basting the Huskies before they hardy get started in the Pacific Coast conference championship race. This was the sixth consecutive time the Webfooters blasted Washington's title hopes with shutout games. The closest the Huskies have come to victory was a scoreless tie with their traditional rivals last year.

The only consolation Coach Jimmy Phelan's gridders got out of the battle was the fact that it was the last time they will have to face Mike Mikulak. It is his last year as a fullback for Oregon.

Mike did everything except tear down the goal posts after the game. He left that one play to his Oregon friends. He stopped numerous threatening drives by the Huskies through the first three periods.

Washington gave the Webfooters plenty to worry about in the first three quarters when time and again they drove deep into Oregon territory, but their scoring plays failed. Forward passes which would have meant touchdowns, went wild or were knocked down, and an attempted field goal from the 10-yard line, by Bill Smith, veteran end, failed to find its mark.

A poor punt put Oregon in possession of the ball in mid-field for the first time and it took advantage of the "break" by charging to a touchdown. Mikulak leaped over the Washington line from the one-yard strip for the score. Milligan failed to convert from placement.

Washington today began pointing for Stanford here October 28, after a "breather" against the College of Puget Sound in Tacoma next Saturday. Oregon takes on Idaho at Eugene next Friday.

PUGET SOUND TO FORE TITLE RACE

SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—(AP)—College of Puget Sound, 1932 Northwest conference champion, was a notch closer to the 1933 title today, taking a last-minute 6-0 victory from Willamette last week-end while Whitman, chief title contender, was pounding out a 23-0 win over Whitworth.

With a scoreless tie looming, the Loggers opened up in the final quarter with a 30-yard passing and running drive that brought them to within 10 yards of scoring ground. After three attempts failed to bring the required yardage, Kimball flipped a fourth-down pass to Carlson for the score.

In the only other conference game, Linfield came up with an 18-0 triumph over Pacific. College of Idaho presented warnings of becoming "bad news" to other conference members by holding the University of Idaho vandals to a 13-0 score in another non-conference tussle. The victors handed Whitman a 60-0 shellacking last week.

ICY JUAN WATERS FOIL LONG SWIM

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Oct. 16.—(AP)—The icy waters of the Strait of Juan de Fuca foiled the first attempt at swim from Victoria, B. C. to Port Angeles.

Roland Tegtmeier of Tacoma, Paul Choteau of Paris, France, and Stan Witty of Victoria, tried it yesterday and gave it up. Tegtmeier managing to stay in the water two hours, 19 minutes, before cramps and the cold put him out. The temperature of the water was 46 degrees above zero. The three started with an escort of boats. Witty was first to leave the water, after 34 minutes, during which he covered one and one-half miles. Choteau swam for an hour and a half, actually covering seven miles in the eb tide before he quit. The swimmers said they would go into training and try again in a few weeks.
