PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, there was duly submitted to the legal voters of said City at the special city election held in and for said City on the 30th day of June, 1933, the following charter amendment amending Section 73 of the Charter of the City of Medford, to read as follows: Section 73.

(a) In the event that the Council shall deem it to be in the best interest of said City, the said Council is hereby authorized to issue the bonds of said City to refund any bonds or warrants including bonds issued pursuant to application to pay assessments in installments, now outstanding, or any such warrants or bonds that may hereafter be lawfully issued hereunder, and to the extent that the aggregate of the par amount of the warrants or bonds to be paid, redeemed or replaced and such refunding bonds shall not provide for a rate of interest thereon in excess of 6% per annum payable semi-annually. In the event the said Council shall be unable to sell any of the refunding bonds herein authorized at the par amount thereof and accrued interest, the said Council is authorized to exchange any or all such bonds or warrants for any or all the bonds or warrants to be refunded and to be refunded and exchanged therefor.

(b) All refunding bonds issued under this act shall be in serial form with definite maturities, and shall mature in equal installments in principal shall become due and payable not later than five years from the date of issue and the last installment shall become due and payable not later than twenty years from the date of issue. The installments of principal shall either be equal or substantially equal in amount or principal and interest due in any year shall be as nearly as practicable, in such sums as will permit of an equal annual tax for the retirement of the principal of and the payment of the interest on said bonds.

(c) All refunding bonds authorized herein shall be of the same class and character as the bonds or warrants refunded and shall constitute a charge upon the same character of revenue, assessments, items or other assets that were applicable to the payment of the bonds or warrants so refunded.

(d) All bonds or warrants refunded as hereinbefore provided, shall be redeemed pursuant to an ordinance duly adopted by the said Council, which said ordinance shall be adopted and take effect in the same manner as other ordinances take effect. The ordinance shall set forth the date, purpose of said interest rate, maturity date or date and the amount of the bonds or warrants to be refunded after application of such sinking or other funds to the payment thereof as shall be specified therein. The ordinance shall also set forth the date, interest rate, and the maturity date or date of the refunding issue, and shall provide for an annual tax levy for other revenues with which to pay the interest on and the principal of the said refunding bonds as they become due and payable.

AND WHEREAS the Council of said City has, in its presence on the 1st day of July, 1933, duly canvassed the returns of said election and it has been determined thereby that the total number of votes cast at said election was 232, that the total number of votes cast in favor of said charter amendment above referred to was 212; and that the total number of votes cast against the same was 20; and it further appearing that the above charter amendment received an affirmative majority of all the votes cast at said election.

AND WHEREAS by virtue of the power and authority in me as Acting Mayor of the City of Medford, I, W. M. CLEMENSON, do hereby issue this Proclamation to the people of said City and to the following effect: that the votes cast in favor of said amendment was as above set forth, and that said measure received an affirmative majority of all the votes cast at said election, and I do hereby declare the above charter amendment to be in full force and effect in said City from and after the publication of this proclamation as required by law.
