

### SPECIAL SESSION SET FOR NOV. 20 BY MEIER EDICT

#### Indigents, Rum Control, and School Fund Trio Of Problems To Come Before State Solons At Salem

SALLEM, Oct. 17.—(AP)—The Oregon legislature will meet here in extraordinary session Monday, November 20, Governor Julius L. Meier announced late yesterday.

Indigent relief, alcoholic beverage control, bus and truck regulation, relief of financially distressed school districts and "certain other emergency matters" were mentioned by Governor Meier as problems requiring the attention of the 90 legislators.

Governor Meier said the formal proclamation would be issued within the next few days. In announcing the date for the third assemblage of the legislature for this year the governor stated:

"In order that funds may be made available for the state to cooperate with the federal government in affording relief to approximately one hundred thousand persons in destitute circumstances because of unemployment, and in order also that legislation may be enacted regulating the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors I have decided to convene the legislature in extraordinary session on November 20, 1933.

"Although the federal government has heretofore allocated funds for the care of the destitute without requiring the state to cooperate, the federal relief administrator, Harry L. Hopkins, recently announced that in the future it would be necessary for the state to match federal funds on a two to one basis, and he has this day formally notified the executive department that federal contributions for relief in Oregon will not be continued beyond the middle of December except on a cooperative basis.

"In view of this policy of the federal government with respect to future relief funds, and in view of the further fact that the various counties and cities are financially unable to carry on any further relief work, there is no alternative left but a special session to provide without means for meeting the demands of the federal relief administration.

"With respect to the need of legislation governing alcoholic beverages, it is sufficient to state that when the prohibition amendment of the federal constitution is repealed a few weeks hence, Oregon will be without any regulatory legislation on this important subject. We must meet the situation promptly if the evils attendant upon the old saloon regime are to be avoided.

"The special session will also afford an opportunity to consider legislation for the relief of financially distressed school districts, remedial legislation connected with bus and truck regulation, and certain other emergency matters which have arisen since the regular legislative session."

### MINOR BLAZES IN APPLIGATE BRUSH

Two fires were reported to the Rogue River forest service headquarters here yesterday afternoon, but both were soon extinguished, after burning over small territories. Stump and slash fires, which got out of control, were given as the causes.

The blaze on Humburg creek in the Appligate section, covered a territory of about 12 or 15 acres on brush land that had been burned over two years ago. The men from the Appligate CCG camp took charge.

The other fire was on Thompson creek, and started from a slash fire.

### COPCO SUIT WITH JURY LATE TODAY

The case in federal court of Roy Hicks against the California Oregon Power company for alleged damages amounting to \$100,000 sustained in an accident last September, was continuing in federal court today, and was expected to go to the jury late this afternoon.

The remainder of the jury panel had been excused until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

### DOWNTOWN RALLY TOMORROW EVE BOAST GRID SHOW

Everything is in readiness for the big high school rally to be held tomorrow night at 7:30 as a start for the campaign to supply the high school football team with new suits, it was announced by Dr. Lee, chairman of the civic affairs committee of the chamber of commerce, today.

### PUBLIC SPEAKING COURSE PLANNED
