COOS BAY SQUAD COMES SATURDAY TO PLAY TIGERS

Crescent City Defeat Puts Local Squad On Dignity—Two Cripples Back In Line-Up.

Real football will be served without trimmings when Marshfield meets Medford on Van Scoyoc field next Saturday at 2:00 o'clock.
In reflective mood from the unexpected defeat at the hands of Crescent City, the local squad is preparing to redeem a season that is still in its infancy. Coach D. K. Burgher and his men entered into a skull conference Monday night to see if they could iron out the rough spots in last Saturday's game. After the skull practice Burgher held a short dummy practice. Last Saturday's defeat demonstrates an old adage in football. No team in the first days of practice can meet a heavier, more experienced team and win. Contrary to past season custom Crescent City this year was no set-up. With a 210-pound fullback and a 185-pound line, it was too much for the local inexperienced players to handle.
Medford has been outweighed many times in the past and still won through superior generalship and knowledge of fundamentals. Sheer lack of time for adequate practice prevented these factors from saving the day Saturday.
Keith Estes, guard, was pronounced well by the doctor. He has missed considerable practice but he is a hard working boy. He will probably see action against Marshfield next Saturday.
Lloyd Hammack, center, another cripple who in the Roseburg game received a torn ligament in his left knee, will be on hand to try to get a dish of Marshfield meat Saturday.

There was little change in the hospital list. Homer Griffith, Cliff Propat and Julius Besco appeared to be rounding into condition again, but there was doubt that Curtis Youel, Capt. Ford Palmer and Bob Erskine would get into Saturday's game, although Erskine promised he would be able to play.

The Trojans went through a long, hard workout yesterday, their last before the game. A light drill will be staged at Sacramento.
