

JUNIOR HIGH SET FOR VICTORY OVER GLENDALE SQUAD

Heftio Struggle Assured Between Old Rivals — Proceeds For Athletic Fund.

Medford Junior High Bull Dogs will have one of their toughest football battles of the season when they meet the Glendale high school on the local field Friday afternoon at 8:30.

Glendale has a wonderful team for a secondary high school and has already defeated the Ashland junior high school, composed of freshmen and sophomores, in two games, but the local junior high has also defeated the Ashland school and by a little higher score than did Glendale; so as comparative scores go should be able to give a good account of themselves. With the exception of a few minor injuries, the local boys are in good condition and are "rarin' to go." This will be the fourth game in as many seasons with Glendale high, the Medford Juniors being on the long end of the score in two of the three games already played, and the team this year is determined to chalk up another victory.

The Bull Dogs showed up well last Friday afternoon in a game against the Tiger Cubs of the local high school. Although the Cubs very greatly outweighed the Bull Dogs, they were unable to score till late in the third quarter, when Kroschel, playing left end for the high school, blocked a punt on the junior high 25 yard line. The ball rolled over the goal line and Kroschel fell on it for a touchdown. The try for a point also was successful, making the score 7-0, the Bull Dogs having scored in the second quarter when Eittinger, quarterback, intercepted a forward pass and ran 60 yards for a touchdown. The Juniors failed to make the extra point.

The student body is hoping for a large crowd tomorrow not only because they expect a real football game but they are making a drive to secure funds to buy some new equipment for the team, which is desperately in need of it. Already a large number of student body tickets have been sold. Quite a number of fans interested in the junior high have purchased season passes and some special donations have been given, but there is still a considerable amount needed to buy the outfit, so it is hoped that everyone interested in these boys, a very large number of whom will go to high school next year, is urged to attend the game tomorrow (Friday) afternoon.

The probable starting lineup for local boys is: Giele and Citer, ends; Tuttle and Gordon, guards; Hayes, center; Santo and Campbell, tackles; Luman and Litrel, halves; Boyd, fullback; and Eittinger, quarter.

STREET SIGNS AS 1934 SEALS BOSS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19. — (AP) — Charles "Gabby" Street, signed as manager of the San Francisco Missions, will have "complete control" of the Pacific Coast league baseball club, Joseph Bearwald, president, said here today.

Bearwald, who announced Street had signed a one-year contract, said the former world's championship manager of the St. Louis Cardinals will come to San Francisco early next year to take charge of the club for the 1934 season.

"He will be in complete charge," Bearwald said; "I intend to obtain for him such players as he wants and are available."

The Missions, one of San Francisco's two home coast league teams, finished seventh in the 1933 pennant race for the eight-club circuit. They led the league in hitting, however.

Bearwald said he will meet Street at the annual minor league meeting at Galveston, Tex., next month to discuss plans for building up the club.

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WALKER, VETERAN OF RING, CLASSES GREB AMONG BEST

Fights Rosenbloom November 3 For Title — Street Brawl With No Purse Is Recounted.

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer.) NEW YORK, Oct. 19. — (AP) — Mickey Walker, the boy bulldog from New Jersey, may be getting old as fighters go. Ring lights have glared down on him as welterweight champion, middleweight king, heavyweight title contender.

The bright lights of other places have shone on him just as long, leaving him an expert both in the ways of the ring and the backyard. He fights Masey Rosenbloom, who likewise has achieved some fame in both directions, for the light heavyweight title in Madison Square Garden, November 3.

Now Mickey is willing to concede Rosenbloom's reputation as a prize fighter. A champion, naturally, stands for progress among the cauliflowerers. But as a flowering bloom among the primroses, Rosenbloom, he insists, cannot qualify.

"Harry Greb," alpha Mickey, reverently "there was a man." "I fought him 15 of the toughest rounds anyone ever lived through in the Polo grounds in 1925. I thought I won, but they gave him the decision, and when it was over I headed for Broadway and a lobster shop I knew. I was all bungled up. He walked Greb as soon as I was settled, and he had a girl with him. Then when we were through he wanted to go dancing. I had to go along. Either that or fight him all over again."

"We must have danced for hours. In fact, we danced so long Harry's girl disappeared. Finally it was getting light and we stumbled out into the morning air. "All of a sudden Harry grabbed me by the back of the neck. Up to that time we hadn't mentioned the fight. "I just want to show you I can lick you any time, anywhere. I'm going to give you another walloping right now," he said. Before I could even argue he squared off and made a rush for me.

"I stepped back and let him have a left hook on the chin as he came in, and he staggered some but came right back, swinging both hands. A second we were all over the street. A cop came running down the sidewalk, swinging his night stick. I saw him lift it high over his head. "Hey!" he yelled at him. "Mickey Walker and that's Harry Greb. We're just kidding a little. Don't hit us!"

"Well, there's the morning newspaper full of the fight we'd had the night before in the ball park, and of all the people in New York who hadn't heard about it we have to pick one, this policeman. He didn't hit us, but he huddled us off the block. Before Harry could get at him, I shoved him into a cab and told the driver to take him home. "I was just getting into bed when the phone rang. "Mickey," says Greb at the other end, "I'm sorry for what I just did, but don't forget I can always lick you!" "I guess maybe he could, at that. But this Rosenbloom... pay no attention. He doesn't either smoke or drink."

TIGER RESERVES TO GET CALL IN TILT SATURDAY

First String Bunged Up—Over-Confidence Fades And Old Fight Returns.

(By Harold Grove.) With half the men on the first string out of practice because of injuries, Medford high school football players settled down to their last hard practice before the game with Marshfield, which will be played on VanScyoc field Saturday afternoon.

The spirit on the Red and Black squad is the best that has been shown here in the past three years. If the Red and Black ever had an over-confident feeling they have certainly lost it now, judging from the actions of the players. The prima donnas are not so much so.

Ronald Baker, guard, was slightly injured in the Crescent City game, but Tuesday, when a hard practice was called, he happened to twist his body, causing it to hurt. He was given an examination and it was found that he had a badly sprained muscle in his back.

Burdette Kindred, a husky tackle, is out of the lineup because of an injured shoulder. He received the injury in Saturday's game with Crescent City.

Ed Bennett, Medford's star end, was on the wrong receiving end when he received a torn muscle during last Saturday's skirmish. He has been going regularly to a doctor for treatments and it is very vague that he will be able to start the game against Marshfield.

Stan Kunzman, the boy who showed promise last Saturday of stardom, is troubled with an old injury. He is being troubled with a "charley horse" again.

Keith Estes, a 180-pound guard, had the doc's o. k. on his knee, but he soon found that his knee was still a little weak. He has been practicing a little on it, but it is not definitely known whether he will participate in Saturday's encounter.

Lloyd Hammarck, center, another boy with an injured knee, found that his knee wasn't as strong as it could be. He may or may not be in the lineup Saturday. The verdict will probably be "may not." His knee is still very weak.

Alan Gebhardt, the raring, tearing fullback, has not had much of a chance to show his ability so far this season. During the first game of the season Al sprained his ankle and has been laid up ever since.

Leo Ghelardi (Leaping Leo) in all probability will not be permitted to dress for Saturday's game because of an operation. Leaping Leo was taken to the doctor's office on the morning of October 14, and right then and there his tonsils were extracted. He has not been seen around the high school building since then, according to Coach Burger.

What is left of the squad is in good shape. The reserves have developed into a hard fighting aggregation. Darwin K. Burger does not predict victory, but he will assure Medford fans that the Tigers will fight like "tigers." Coach Fred Osborn and his Pirates, consisting of 20 men, are expected to arrive in Medford late Friday.

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KOGUT, BELCASTRO WIN MAT TUSSLES
