

BUSINESS SHIFT FROM MAIN SEEN UNLESS IMPROVED

Fears of a definite shift of the business center of Medford from Main street, unless widening and lighting of the street is accomplished in the near future, were voiced today by a number of citizens, advocating the proposed widening of East Main, halted Tuesday night by the filing of protests with the city council.

A tendency of business to drift from the long-time center of activity is already noted. Mayor E. M. Wilson said today. Unless the street is improved, numerous property owners will leave the city. Frequent complaints have come to him, many of them insisting upon early lighting of the street, which cannot be economically accomplished until the street is widened.

The program proposed for improvement of the street provided for the widening of Bear creek bridge by the city at a cost of \$4,000 and the widening of East Main from Front to Almond, exclusive of the bridge, by the property owners, at a cost of \$12,000, the complete project to cost \$16,000. The sum to be furnished by the city was included in the last budget and two preceding it.

The unit cost to property owners was estimated at \$150 per 50-foot frontage. A number of property owners who signed the original petition advocating the improvement, filed protests Tuesday night. The city having agreed to widen the bridge with the understanding that the property owners would widen the street, immediately became reluctant regarding expenditure of the \$4,000. The matter was, as a result, referred back to the committee, which had not met to consider the matter further today.

If the street is to be improved, Mayor Wilson pointed out today, lighting and widening should be accomplished at the same time as putting the lights in now and widening later, would cost the city a double amount of money. The lighting of the street must be accomplished in the near future if business is to be retained by the section, the police department emphasized last Tuesday.

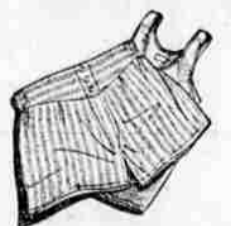
