AMERICAN LIQUOR INTERESTS TO GET REPEAL BENEFIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(UP)—In the face of widely expressed fears that the repeal of the 18th amendment will find the United States facing a liquor famine, the administration took drastic steps today to prevent a threatened flood of foreign labels, licitly and illicitly imported.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—(UP)—British distillers were shocked and indignant today at the United States embargo on foreign liquors and wines.

They already have negotiated for huge sales to American interests, it was pointed out, the sums involved totaling possibly in the neighborhood of £2,000,000 (about \$9,180,000).

Furthermore, the distillers here in Scotland have been running full blast in recent months, anticipating huge and continuous orders after repeal of prohibition in America. In 1932, three-fourths of the Scottish distilleries closed with as high as 10 years' supplies on hand which they were unable to sell, due to excessive taxation.

PARIS, Oct. 20.—(UP)—The American liquor embargo caused consternation among French wine interests today and reports in official quarters said the foreign office had cabled the French embassy in Washington to lodge a strong protest with the department of state against the decree.

MUSSOLINI HOLDS F.D.R. A DICTATOR ALSO ADVERTISER

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Politically, President Roosevelt and Premier Mussolini are, in the opinion of II

Duce, brothers under the skin. Gilbert T. Hodges declared today. Hodges, chairman of the board of the Advertising Federation of America, addressed the Advertising club of New York, reporting on a recent conversation he had with Premier Mussolini in Italy.

"The premier asked about our American parliaments," said Hodges, "and I told him they had abdicated in favor of Mr. Roosevelt. "I told him they apparently were glad to pass the responsibility over to the President. "Well, replied Premier Mussolini, 'Doesn't that make Mr. Roosevelt a dictator?' "I told him that it looked a little that way to me and he appeared to think so, too." Hodges said the premier was keenly interested in President Roosevelt

and the NRA program, and wanted to know how it was progressing.

The secret of II Duce's power, Hodges declared, lay in his intelligent use of advertising.

"He is a natural-born salesman and unequalled as a showman," he continued. "He first perfected his plan and then he utilized every form of advertising to gain the support of the people."

Hodges said the success of Mussolini's plan gave him "great confidence in the ultimate success of the NRA."

"I believe," he asserted, "that President Roosevelt understands the force and value of intelligent advertising better than any previous President, and that he is selling his plan to the people by the liberal use of every form of advertising."

CHILOQUIN WINS PLEA FOR WATER

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20.—(AP)—The city of Chiloquin, Klamath county, was granted one second foot of water from the Klamath river, the secretary of the Interior telegraphed State Engineer C. E. Stricklin today.

The application to receive the water from the Klamath river was filed with the government after Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle held that the state could not release water from the Klamath river, which flows in Oregon and California.
