## MORGAN RETURNS FROM HUNT, BALKS AT N.R.A. COMMENT

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—(AP)—J. P. Morgan, America's most noted banker, was in a quandary about the new banking laws as he returned on the Berengaria today from a sojourn of three months in Europe.

"It is the business of the banks to obey the law," he said, "but I don't know yet what that means."

Morgan's interview was the first he has ever granted to ship news reporters.

He talked enthusiastically about improvement in England but declined to comment on the NRA or anything that had been going on in his own country.

"Don't you see," he said, "I want to get the feel of the water and talk to those who do know what's going on."

"Do you feel," he was asked, "that private bankers will have to concentrate on investment banking rather than commercial banking as the result of the new banking law?"

"When I went away three months ago," he replied, "I said I didn't know what the new laws mean and that we would have to find out first and then do whatever we are supposed to do."

In declining to discuss any phase of the NRA, he said: "I don't know enough about it."

"England is getting on very well," he said. "Improvement certain is well set in there. The heavy industries are showing improvement and the whole feeling there is that things are better and improving."
