PHANTOM SHIP COLLISION CAUSE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Tales of a mystery ship in the fog about Point Sur, 110 miles south of here yesterday morning, and death to three officers that came in the crash of the U. S. S. Chicago and the British freighter Silverpalm were told today by officers of the cruiser as it prepared to proceed to Mare Island naval yard to get the 40-foot hole torn in her port bow repaired. The two ships crashed at 8 a. m. yesterday, while Vice-Admiral Harria Laning, Captain Manley Simons and Captain Herbert E. Kays, said, the Chicago maneuvered to escape a "large freighter off our starboard side, which disappeared in the fog a few minutes later."
