Portland, Ore., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Only the approval of Secretary of Agriculture Wallace remained today to make effective a blanket license system that will affect every handler of the fruit in the Pacific Northwest. The system was expected to go into effect today as the result of an agreement reached here last night by the control committee of Northwest Fruit Industries, Inc., Paul A. Scherer, Medford, president of the organization, announced.

The license system will be established in accordance with a marketing agreement signed October 13 by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace and will apply to the tree fruit industry in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

Amendment Made—The marketing agreement was finally accepted by the control committee of Northwest Fruit Industries, Inc., last night after four days of intensive conferences here and only after an amendment to the agreement had been adopted.

Scherer said a "whirlwind sign-up" campaign was conducted by wire, telephone and airplane yesterday with the result that the required percentage of the tree fruit tonnage was signed up by 6 p. m. to make the amendment effective. He did not disclose the nature of the amendment.

The marketing agreement is designed, Scherer said, to improve the lot of the tree fruit industry in the northwest. The NFI was created to administer the agreement in the Pacific Northwest.
