## LIQUOR CONTROL GETS ATTENTION AS FLOOD NEARS

Iowa—Commission is now drafting proposed state law, under which a state holding company would control subsidiary manufacture and retail sales of hard liquors through state stores.

Kansas—has had state prohibition laws since 1880, with little chance of repeal.

Kentucky—Referendum on repeal of state prohibition laws cannot be passed before January, 1934.

Louisiana—Special session of the legislature to set up control laws and impose whisky tax, to be used for schools and hospitals.

Maine—Special session of legislature to be summoned after national repeal with sentiment against return of saloons in Oregon of Oregon walnuts, appears indicated in a survey of the industry. The crop now being harvested is scarcely more than one-fifth of normal per acre, dealers say, although some of the deficiency will be offset in increased bearing acreage.

Massachusetts—Legislative recess commission is studying control, with some sort of "controlled saloon" favored.

Michigan—Control system similar to the Canadian system being studied by commission, for introduction to legislature probably in January.

Minnesota—Control committee of 66 members is studying methods of other states, with special legislative session likely.

Mississippi—No action taken as yet on repeal, but there is agitation for a special session of the legislature.

Missouri—State control commission as recommended that hard liquor be sold in hotels and restaurants, with no wholesale dealer being allowed a hand in retailing. Special session probably will be called.

Montana—Liquor control bill already passed, provides for state liquor stores for off-premises consumption.

Nevada—Control laws provide for local control by city authorities and special liquor boards.

New Hampshire—Laws already in force provide, after repeal for the sale of ales, beers and wines of six percent strength.

New Jersey—Old "tavern and inn" statutes probably will serve as control laws until legislative action is obtained.

New Mexico—New law provides for package sales with on-premises consumption permitted in hotels and restaurants.

New York—Alcoholic beverage control commission, which controls beer sales, also will control hard liquor.

North Carolina—No provision has been made for a state referendum, with next legislative meeting in 1935.

North Dakota—No action as yet, but special session may be called.

Ohio—Legislative hearings being held on control methods.

Oklahoma—Will remain bone dry unless repeal is voted in next year's primaries.

Oregon—Non-partisan commission is drawing up law patterned on Quebec system, restricting hard liquor sales to state dispensaries.

Pennsylvania—Legislature to consider liquor control next month, with sentiment against return of the saloon.

Rhode Island—Alcoholic beverage commission working on plan which must be passed by general assembly.

South Carolina—Has statutory prohibition known as "aunt's month" law.

South Dakota—Will vote on repeal of state prohibition in November 1934.

Tennessee—No prospect of early action on a state dry law.

Texas—No additional legislation contemplated, with present laws making state virtually bone dry.

Utah—Not expected to permit anything other than 3.2 beer.

Vermont—Special session of the legislature discussed but very uncertain.

Virginia—Control plans being studied by legislative commission.

Washington—Governor's commission to study plans, with little chance of special legislative session.

West Virginia—To vote on repeal of state laws in 1934.

Wisconsin—Legislative hearings being held, with committee favoring widespread sale of hard liquor in taverns.

Wyoming—To vote on state enforcement repeal in 1934.
