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GOLF EXPONENTS TELL BENEFIT AT ROTARY MEETING

H. Chandler Egan laid aside his nibble and mangle today to address the members of the Medford Rotary club at their weekly luncheon at the Hotel Medford. The golf expert entertainingly told the Rotarians about the system of conducting the National Amateur championship matches, and predicted an early change in the present method of qualifying in this national tournament due to the constantly increasing number of good golfers being developed in every section of the United States.

The number of qualifying golfers will probably be increased, in Mr. Egan's opinion, resulting in more 18-hole matches in the title tournament. According to the present system, established years ago, many excellent players are early eliminated and one 18-hole round has proven hardly a fair test for entries. Upon being urged by members of the Rotary club, "Chan" described his match with former National Amateur Champion Johnny Goodwin, in which the Medford player scored a hard-fought victory.

Leonard Carpenter, who preceded Mr. Egan as speaker today, pointed out the importance of the fine Rogue Valley golf course to this community. "It is time for people here to fully appreciate the excellence of Medford's sporty 18-hole course and the climate here, which makes possible year-round playing," Mr. Carpenter said. An average of 1200 golfers play 40 visitors from outside communities each year, according to Mr. Carpenter's estimate. This fine drawing card for visitors not only has a substantial bearing on business in this community, but also brings outstanding publicity to southern Oregon, the speaker said. In addition to this, the various tournaments held by the Rogue Valley club bring from 25 to 40 visitors from outside communities each time they are held.

In lauding the Medford golf course, Mr. Carpenter pointed out that E. Chandler Egan had laid out the 18 holes, considered one of the finest on the Pacific coast.

Pete Denon and Hamilton Patton, program chairman, were among the speakers who also impressed upon the Rotarians the importance of the local course as a magnet to draw sportmen to this community.

Before the golf program was presented, Chairman Charlie Wing introduced Frank Hull, head of the Medford Community Chest drive, who urged the Rotarians to interest themselves in the need for a successful chest campaign. Mr. Hull stressed the importance of "man power" behind the effort to raise funds and pointed

The freighter sends a boarding party to the ship, and the mate climbs aboard. He never returns when the party reach the deck they find him dead in his own blood.

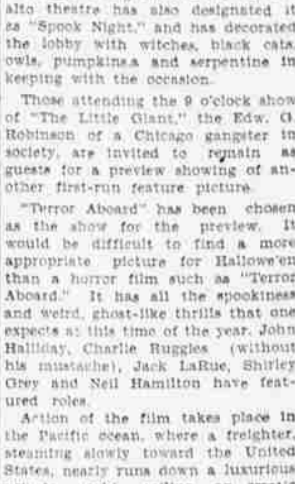
Then the events leading up to the moment are recreated on the screen. From all reports, there should be enough thrills to satisfy even the most hardened.
