PLANS DRAWN FOR SPEEDY RAZING OF FAIR STRUCTURES

Eighteen Months Allowed for Removal of All Buildings on Extensive Grounds.

CHICAGO (UP)—When the buildings of a Century of Progress were being put up, Chicago gasped at the rapidity of their construction.

That rapidity will be matched and even surpassed, however, when the buildings are razed.

For under the fair's contract with the South park board, the grounds must be cleared in eighteen months, and all buildings, with one exception, either will be demolished, or removed. The exception is the Administration building, which will serve as an office building for the board.

Major Lenox R. Lohr, general manager of the fair, said:

"The machinery of demolition will be set in motion the instant a Century of Progress closes. That instant officially is midnight October 31. This must happen whether we like it or not because of financial stringency and the absolute need to conserve all available cash."

The first step in the dismantling process will be the disbanding of the personnel which managed the exposition, reducing the organization to a skeleton. Next will come the prompt removal of all exhibits from the buildings that housed them. The fair management has promised each exhibitor will get his property back in good condition. The return of the exhibits will be the third step in the program.

The fourth and final step will be the tearing down and removal of the buildings. All the landscaping, thousands of trees and shrubs, and wharves, and all manner of ornamental lighting on the ground will be left to the South park board.

WASHINGTON, OREGON TOP LUMBER OUTPUT DESPITE DEPRESSION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Washington and Oregon, although production dropped off by millions of feet, held their places as the first and second lumber producing states of the nation in 1932. They were the only states reporting cuts of five billion feet or more.

This was disclosed today in a report of the department of commerce which sets the 1932 Washington production at 2,260,589,000 feet, and the
