Also they thought the cheap track it did not work out that way. The trouble with orthodox economists is they cannot see the woods for the trees.

Mr. Roosevelt's gold price step cannot be found in any book of economic history. There is no reason to believe his next step will be. Also there is no reason to believe he will fall in his ultimate objective of high commodity prices because one, two or even three steps will.

The big of currency tricks is by no means easy. The astute Washington correspondent of a British newspaper analyzed the new international gold policy for his London readers substantially as follows:
