practically impossible for him to view traffic, coming from the rear.  
Figures show that the greatest number of deaths from pedestrian accidents are caused by pedestrians crossing between intersections. The percentage is 27. Sixteen per cent of the accidents, resulting in death, occur when people are walking on the highways, and only 11 per cent are caused by children. The remainder result from pedestrians stepping from behind cars and miscellaneous accidents.
