JUBILEE PROGRAM SHAPED AT MEET COMMITTEEMEN

Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration took definite form last night, when members of the general committee gathered for their first session at the Chamber of Commerce, and outlined various steps of the observance of the state's birthday, to open here June 3, 1934.

E. C. (Jerry) Jerome, general chairman of the celebration, presided at the enthusiastic gathering, headed by the enthusiastic belief that "Old Man Oregon" has a birthday party coming, and that he'll blow the candles out in Medford at the close of the biggest celebration in seventy-five years of statehood.

No concessions will be granted space at the celebration unless they are passed on by the general committee, to protect the public against racketeering. Entertainment will be constant and the pioneer, who made Oregon's birth possible, will be glorified throughout the week, with every section of the state cooperating in the program.

There will be a day for everybody - farmer to merchants - and the dog races are expected to draw visitors from all sections of the coast, Mr. Jerome stated.

Governor Julius L. Meier, who is giving Medford his unqualified support in the celebration, has written the mayor of every city in the state, asking that committees be appointed to start work on the birthday party.

Portland Soused By One Inch Rain

PORTLAND, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Nearly one inch of rain was added yesterday and last night to the excess precipitation for both the year and the season here. In the 24-hour period Portland received .93 of an inch. About .7 of an inch of rain fell in a four-hour period last night.

VALLEY TURKEY CROP IS UNDER PREVIOUS YEAR

The turkey output of the Rogue River valley this season will be between 30,000 and 35,000—less than last year, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler. The birds are of good size and healthy. There has been some buying for California markets. This week a buyer sought two "larks" of young turkeys. The price "larks" has been 25 and 27 cents per pound.

A 20 cent shortage in the national turkey crop has been recorded in some trade journals. The recent heat wave in California held back the development of some of the turkeys of that section. Turkey prices today in San Francisco ranged a cent higher than a year ago, and were quoted at 23 and 30 cents per pound. The price is expected to advance as Thanksgiving approaches.

Holdings of frozen turkeys are reported as low. Poultry Producers of Central California Tuesday quoted turkeys as follows: Poultry young, hen, all weights, 25 cents per pound; Poultry young, all weights, 24 cents per pound; Poultry young, 11 to 17 pounds, 26 cents per pound; Poultry young, 17 to 22 pounds, 26 cents per pound.
