

MARY ELMIRA COX, FORMER RESIDENT, CALLED BY DEATH

Mary Elmira Cox, wife of True Cox, passed away at Woodland, California, on Thursday morning, November 2.

Elmira Gregory was born at Fort Churchill, Nevada, on August 8, 1869. She came with her parents to southern Oregon at the age of three years, spending her girlhood in the Rogue River valley.

She was united in marriage February 14, 1883 to Daniel Trust Cox and two daughters were born to this union.

She moved with her husband and family, to California about 25 years ago, living the greater part of this time at Winters, in the Sacramento valley, but she has always thought of Medford as home.

Mrs. Cox became a member of the Presbyterian church many years ago and was a fine Christian character. She is survived by her husband, two daughters, Mrs. Ethel Elliott, of Denver, Colorado, Miss Hazel Cox of Winters, California; two granddaughters, Irene and Dorothy Elliott, of Denver, her mother, Mrs. Louisa Gregory of Medford, four sisters, Mrs. Lillian Nye, Mrs. Josephine Yashin and Mrs. Tamar Kershaw all of Medford, and Mrs. Jessie Douglas of Eugene, and one brother, Basil Gregory of Eureka, Calif.

The remains will arrive in Medford for burial Saturday morning, accompanied by Mr. Cox. Funeral services will be conducted at the Conger Funeral Parlors on West Main street Sunday at 2:30 p. m., November 8th. Interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Medford.

HOLIDAY SHOPPING TO PROVIDE SPUR LAGGING BUSINESS

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The pace of business continues hesitant but actual declines generally are being held within narrower confines, the Dun & Bradstreet weekly trade review said today.

"With the best selling period of the year immediately ahead," asserted the review, "the multiplied demands incident to Christmas shopping are counted upon to give the final impetus to the movement of any weighty merchandise accumulations, and thus revive wholesale markets and bring a more marked improvement to industrial centers by the full force of spring replenishment requirements."

"The substantial check to the down trend of the general commodity price level was one of the most significant developments of the week, because of some of the hesitancy which has resulted in postponement of orders for needed materials, through fear of possible inventory losses."

"Weather conditions were not conducive to much activity in such lines as dry goods, men's and women's apparel, shoes and hardware supplies, resulting in volume falling below that of the week preceding in most sections."

"With the exception of some increases in orders for Christmas merchandise and covering of spring general volume of wholesale trade held about to the level of the week preceding."

END OF DOWNPOUR PROMISED COAST

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—(AP)—A break in the weather that in the past few days has deluged the Pacific northwest with rain, was promised by the weatherman here today.

"Fair tonight and Saturday," the forecast said, "with some fog at night. Little change in temperature. Northwest winds."

The precipitation in Portland this week reached 6.43 inches, night. A torrential rain between 5 and 6:30 o'clock last night brought a half-inch of rain, and the total was .87 of an inch. So far he had 2.26 inches during the day.

The Willamette river here rose more than one foot in the 24-hour period. A further moderate rise is expected.
