# Gay Memories of Russian Embassy Stirred Anew by Recognition Talk



For 16 years the million-dollar Russian embassy in Washington has stood vacant. Its colorful life under the czar only a memory. M. L. E. Miskow (left) whose husband was a Russian naval attaché until the revolution, recalls its flashing crowds and ceremonies; Col. Alexander Greger (right) is another of the trio remembering the former splendor of legation and embassy life.

WASHINGTON — (P)—Only three persons remain in Washington who took part in official life as members of the diplomatic corps representing the Russian czar's government. And now, as Washington and Moscow prepare for conversations looking to possible resumption of diplomatic relations, these three remember the days when brilliant Cossack uniforms flashed in the crowds at the early

legation building, and later at the magnificent embassy which the czar's government bought in 1913. That building has stood for 16 years now. Trio recalls its glories. Two of the three who recall the

diplomatic life here under the czar are Capt. and Mme. I. E. Miskow. The captain was naval attaché here when the czarist government fell. The third is Col. Alexander Greger, secretary at the Russian legation here 40 years ago.

Mme. Miskow, as a girl in "Petersburg" as she still calls the Russian capital, was named lady-in-waiting to the Empress Alexandra. Her two most prized possessions are a picture of the Grand Duchess Elizabeth and the sparkling bar-pin of diamonds given her by the empress when she was named to the court.

Colonel Greger, although he has been honored by 27 decorations for his brilliant career as a soldier and diplomat, treasures above all else his Cross of St. George. The cross was given to a very few people by the czar for extreme bravery.

Beas Little Dress Shop. Mrs. Miskow has met the years since 1917 by opening a little dress shop here. Her husband has gone into business. They have become American citizens.

Colonel Greger, also an American citizen, saw his family fortunes wiped out and their place in the Crimea confiscated. He began his new life by teaching languages in Baltimore. Now he holds a position with the United States tariff commission.

When General Joffre of France passed through Baltimore he met the former Russian diplomat, whom he had known in Paris during the World War.

Oddly enough, the colonel has chosen to live next door to the vacant embassy, at the Racquet club. And oddly, too, he never has been inside it, as he was in Europe during the years it was being used.

Opened With Ceremonies. But Mme. Miskow remembers the "Te Deum" ceremony when the embassy was opened and blessed, a custom observed by the old Russians whenever they moved into a new home. Just the embassy "family" was present as a Russian orthodox priest went from one to another of the 84 rooms blessing the house. She also remembers the two dinners given weekly by the czar's ambassador, George Bakmetoff. There were always 22 people invited.

The impressive building was erected 30 years ago by Mrs. George M. Pullman, wife of the builder of rail-
