

SALE OF BUTTER TAKES SHARP DIP AS PRICES RISE

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Sales of butter at retail have dropped approximately 35 to 45 per cent in Portland within the period that the price advanced 2c lb. Survey of the situation by the Journal indicated that the public was reacting in a most substantial way to recent manipulative tactics of the trade. Such tactics were not confined to the local territory but appeared general throughout the country.

HOLZGANG'S SUIT FOR CAR INJURY OPENING MONDAY

The damage suit of Victor Holzgang, 10, against Mrs. L. T. Ward of Red Bluff, Calif., for \$25,000, as a result of an auto. accident on the Jacksonville highway last September, will start in circuit court Monday morning.

The lad files the action through his mother, as guardian, and it is based on the allegation that Mrs. Ward was driving in a careless manner, striking the plaintiff as he was crossing the highway near his home, and causing injuries.

The defense asserts that young Holzgang darted in front of the Ward auto from behind a truck and that Mrs. Ward was unable to stop the car in time to avoid the accident.

Suit of the Columbia River Paper mills against W. H. Arnold and the Medford Pear Growers is docketed to start next Wednesday. The amount is for approximately \$3000. Besides Arnold, 27 other growers of the valley are listed as defendants.

The Medford Pear Growers was one of the organizations formed by L. A. Banks, local agitator, now serving a life sentence for murder. Wrapping paper was ordered from the company by Banks in the name of the organization. Defendants hold that the paper was used by Banks in his own packing business and that they, individually or collectively, received no benefits, and did not authorize its purchase. The plaintiff holds that the act of an official binds the organization.

Attorneys for the paper mill are George M. Roberts and William McAllister, for the various defendants, Geo. Newbury, Frank P. Farrell, W. E. Phipps, T. J. Enright, W. C. Trail and Porter J. Neff.

GIRL NEEDS HELP NOT DETENTION IS BELIEF OF COURT

Beulah Thompson, 16, a comely maid listed by her mother as "incorrigible," presents a problem to the juvenile court. The mother charged that Beulah went to a dance Wednesday, and did not come home all night. The girl says she spent the night with a girl friend. Yesterday Beulah told County Judge Earl B. Day her side of the story. Today she will have another talk with the official. The county court desires that some women join with him in the solution of the problem. Beulah is held in the women's ward of the county jail, pending a decision.

Beulah, it seems from her story, is not as incorrigible as painted, and is not a bad girl at heart. She never had a chance, the court says, and went to the dance and failed to return home, to get away from unpleasant circumstances at home. The authorities balk at sending her to the reform school, on the grounds it would do no reforming, and she would emerge worse instead of better, after "hard-boiled" contacts in the state institution.

Beulah's father is dead and she, with her mother, "hitch-hiked" to this county from Indiana last summer, arriving in the early fall. They lived in the Trail district for several months, and moved to this city later.

42 CCC WORKERS GO TO CARBERRY

Forty-two CCC men, enrolled from the Portland district, arrived in Medford on the Oregonian this morning from Vancouver, B.C., in Washington. They left immediately by truck for the Carberry Creek camp, where they will be stationed.

FRENCH DESTINY IN BALANCE SAYS PREMIER SARRAUT

parasites," a revival of foreign trade through preferential tariff readjustment and "monetary sacrifices" by the people for the "common safety."

Must Show Strength The premier said France must show strength "in the face of a troubled world in which violence and restrictions of liberty endanger, instead of assuring, the safety prayed for by anguished peoples."

In such a world, Sarraut continued, "France's credit necessitates the guarantee of a fully balanced budget."

"A currency which is the soundest and the most solid," he added, "nevertheless faces domestic perplexities and foreign uncertainties and requires a treasury free from sapping deficits. Our country must not again suffer the anxious hours of the past."

Foreign Policy Holds The French foreign policy will continue unchanged, the premier said, in referring to "the United States, which brings across the ocean collaboration in peace work" with which Europe could not dispense.

The deputies gave the frock-coated Sarraut one of the coolest receptions the chamber has seen in many years as he read his declaration in a voice barely audible.

Listeners regarded his remarks as a direct appeal to the center, slighting the socialists. Even he left wing radicals failed to applaud.

The vote of confidence probably will be postponed until Monday.

Eve's Bead Found While Digging In Durango Garden
