

JAPAN REINFORCES ARMY STRENGTH IN NORTH MANCHURIA

PEIPING, Nov. 3.—(AP)—With speculation rife regarding possible trouble between Russia and Japan in Manchuria, great interest has been aroused by Japan's sudden complete withdrawal of troops from the demilitarized zone.

The Japanese began withdrawing the troops some time ago in accordance with terms of the Tangu armistice.

With the sudden complete withdrawal, a full Japanese division now will be made available in northern Manchuria in case relations with the Soviets grow worse.

Reversing its former stiff attitude, Japan allowed Chinese police to bring artillery and machine guns into the neutral zone to fight bandits—thus constituting a police military body capable of controlling the area.

Despite the withdrawal of troops from the so-called demilitarized zone, however, China's great wall from Shanghai to Kopeki remains in the hands of the Japanese, who do not intend to evacuate, a Japanese military attack declared today.

TYPHOON STRIKES PHILIPPINES AGAIN

MANILA, P. I., Nov. 3.—(AP)—The second deadly typhoon to sweep the archipelago within a week moved northward across the China sea today, leaving dead variously estimated at between 20 and 30 and heavy property damage.

Accompanied by a torrential down-pour, the wind reaching a velocity of a hundred miles an hour, destroyed hundreds of the natives' picturesque grass huts, wrecked numerous other buildings and many small boats.

Although yesterday's typhoon was described as moderate by the weather bureau, it was the most severe the Philippines has seen this year. It ripped down telegraph wires and flooded the streets of Ilo Ilo and Cebu, principal cities of the southern islands.

The Red Cross in Manila moved to send relief, in some instances authorizing provincial chairmen to meet the emergency.

FORMER SHERIFF OF UNION COUNTY DIES

LA GRANDE, Ore., Nov. 3.—(P)—John H. McLachlen, former sheriff of Union county and chief of police in LaGrande for many years, died here Thursday at the age of 52. Ten days ago he fell from a tree while picking apples, breaking three ribs. His injuries and the shock caused his death.

McLachlen headed the posse which captured the slayers of Til Taylor, sheriff of Umatilla county, several years ago. Funeral services will be held in LaGrande tomorrow.

1 1/2 cups diced cooking ham
1 egg yolk
1 egg, hard cooked
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1 tablespoon chopped green pepper
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
2 tablespoons fat, melted
1/2 cup milk

Mix ingredients and pour into buttered, medium sized baking pan and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold and surround with savory sauce.

Savory Sauce
(For fish or meat loaves)
2 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1-1/3 cups milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos
1 tablespoon chopped celery
1/2 cup cooked peas
Melt butter and add flour. When blended, add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients and cook two minutes. Pour over loaf.

Sweet Potatoes Dixie
2 boiled sweet potatoes (large)
1 egg
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons cream
1 teaspoon butter
4 marshmallows.

Marshmallows and add egg and seasonings. Add cream and butter. Beat well and roughly pile into buttered baking dish. Top with marshmallows and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.

Hot buttered toast, spread with cream cheese and raspberry jam makes a delicious bit to serve with hot tea or coffee to afternoon callers.

Baked Pork Chops
(Dinner for Four)

Baked Pork Chops.

8 rib chops
1-3 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons chopped celery
2 tablespoons chopped onions
3 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons fat.

Have chops cut 2-3 inch thick. Wipe with lamp cloth and roll them in flour. Sprinkle with salt and paprika. Put into small baking pan. Top with remaining ingredients, add a lid and bake one hour in moderate oven. Turn chops to allow even cooking.

Apple Rings.
4 apples
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup water
16 whole cloves
1 stick bark cinnamon
Red fruit coloring
2 tablespoons vinegar
Wash apples. Cut in one-half inch crossway slices. Remove cores. Do not peel apple rings. Mix sugar, water and spices. Boil 2 minutes. Add red coloring to give the desired tint. Add vinegar. Add apples and bake one hour in moderate oven. Turn apples and allow even cooking.

Escalloped Potatoes.
4 cups sliced raw potatoes
4 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
2 tablespoons butter
2 cups milk.
Mix potatoes with seasonings. Add rest of ingredients and pour into buttered baking dish. Bake 60 minutes in moderate oven.

Chocolate Cottage Pudding.
2 cups pastry flour
2-3 cup sugar
2-3 cup baking powder
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
2-3 cup milk
2 squares chocolate, melted
4 tablespoons fat, melted.
Mix ingredients and beat 2 minutes. Pour into shallow pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Cut in squares and serve fresh with cream of vanilla sauce.

4 tablespoons bacon fat
3 tablespoons chopped onions
3 tablespoons chopped green pepper
2 cups tomatoes
2-3 cup of cheese, cut fine
2 eggs, beaten
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika.

Heat the fat in frying pan. Add and brown onions and peppers. Add tomatoes and cook 5 minutes. Add rest of ingredients. Cook slowly and stir constantly 3 minutes. Pour around rice cakes.

Rice Cakes.
1 1/2 cups boiled rice
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1-3 cup flour
4 tablespoons fat
Mix rice and seasonings. Shape into 4 cakes and roll in flour. Heat fat in frying pan and add and brown cakes. Arrange on platter and surround with cheese, Dutch style, and garnish with parsley.

Cream Pie.
1 baked pie shell
1/2 cup sugar
5 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
2 egg whites, beaten
5 tablespoons confectioner's sugar.
Blend 1/2 cup of sugar with flour. Add salt, yolks and milk. Cook in double boiler until mixture becomes thick and creamy. Stir frequently while cooking. Add extracts and pour into baked pie shell. Beat whites and add the confectioner's sugar. Beat until creamy. Roughly spread over pie filling and bake 12 minutes in slow oven.

Garnish light foods with dark foods and vice versa. Try to avoid monotony of type and color of food.

NINE NEGROES DIE IN TENEMENT FIRE

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 3.—(P)—Nine negroes, six of them children, lost their lives when fire swept a three-story building in a tenement district today.

Three others are in a hospital in a critical condition from burns.

The dead were trapped on the roof and top floor of the building after the fire spread rapidly from the ground floor.

Police said the origin of the fire was of suspicious character and ordered an investigation.

The dead were: Marjorie, 16, James, 15, and Fred Singleton, 7; June, 8 months old, and Daisy Harden, 22; Jessie Harris, 38; Beatrice, 4; Robert, Jr., 8; and Robert Lindsey, Sr., 42.

The injured: William, 81, and Juanita Harden, 6; and Milton Lindsey, 15.
