

MARIN COLLEGE BOASTS GLASSY GRIDIRON TEAM

Saturday's Game Here With
Sons Will Give Glimpse of
College-Caliber Play —
Kickoff Slated 2:15 P. M.

Marin Junior college of San Francisco will bring a great football team to Medford Saturday for the clash on Van Scoyoc field with the Southern Oregon Normal eleven. Included in the lineup are several all-San Francisco stars, two transfers from St. Mary's, one Oakland all-city man and numerous veterans of the Junior college conference.

Vincent Walker, 215-pound end for Marin, is an all-conference man and reported to be the best junior college player in California. He is a letterman. Steve Gillardi, right guard, is also an all-conference man and is also the best guard in the bay district. Bill Figur at right tackle, Red Lund at center, and Barrett Ely at left end, are all veteran lettermen. D'Alfonso, left guard, is an all-city tackle from Oakland. Henry Luter, left tackle, is the only inexperienced man in the line.

Red Stevens, quarterback for Marin, is an all-city man from San Francisco, and will enter St. Mary's next year. He runs, kicks and passes and is exceptionally fast in shifting. At fullback is another all-city player from San Francisco, George Lapin. The two halfbacks, Saur and Nutting, are transfers from St. Mary's. They have replaced lettermen of last year who are out on the squad.

Impressive Record.
This college football team has an impressive record to date, culminated by a 26-0 win over the strong Mare Island Marines.

The SONS, after losing a hard-fought game to the Oregon State Iron men, have come back to win their last four starts, taking Pacific university, 19-0; Monmouth, 12-7; the Oregon State Freshmen, 39-0, and the Oregon Freshmen, 7-0. Expecting the hardest game of the season Saturday, Coach Hobson will probably send the following lineup against the bay champions: Connie Mahoney, diminutive veteran center from Bend, will start the game, with Harold Anderson, veteran guard, on the right side and Jim McClain, freshman from Eugene, at left guard.

Howell to Play.
Harvey Oakes of Portland and Ross Carter of Lakeview, both veterans, will be with the tackles, with Ward Howell, sensational 210-pound Ashland boy, a freshman, at right end. Bill Rasmussen, freshman speed merchant from Bend, will be on the other wing. In the backfield, Cecil Fugitt, freshman from Longview, where he was all-state quarterback, will start for the SONS at quarter. Elmer Brown, triple threat star from Bend, who was on the Oregon squad last year, will play left half, with the veteran Al Bradford, Oklahoma flash. Powell Lancaster, playing his last year for the SONS, will be at fullback. Lancaster is considered one of the best kickers and runners on the Pacific coast. The most likely looking SONS reserves are Bob Beach, fullback from Longview; Carl Ayres, ex-Portland all-star end; Bill Robinson, Centralia, Wash., star, also an end; Roy Northam, freshman guard from Eugene; Jack Cook, triple threat man from Grants Pass, and Lewis McClain, heavy quarterback from Klamath Falls. All these boys are freshmen.

The game is being sponsored by business and professional men of Medford.

right guard; Connie Mahoney, center; Dwight Patterson, left guard and Bill Robinson. Carter, Oakes, Patterson, Anderson and Mahoney are veterans. Anderson is a former Medford high school star and the giant Howell is a former Ashland high luminary. In the teachers' backfield will be Al Bradford and Powell Lancaster of last year's team;

Elmer Brown of Bend, who played last year with Oregon university, and Cecil Fugitt, ex-Longview, Wash., high school student rated as all-state quarterback; Jack Cook of Grants Pass may see action in the S. O. N. S. backfield due to his unusual passing ability. He can have a football 73 yards, which is rated a record for this section of the country.

LAW AND ORDER GROUP BATTLES FARMER FORCES

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., Nov. 3.—(AP) After engaging in a pitched battle last night with a large picket force seeking to keep farm products from market, members of a newly organized law and order league today guarded the Iowa end of the Missouri river bridge here, determined to keep traffic moving.

Clubs and flats were swung freely in the skirmish last night, staged after the pickets, most of them Iowans, retreated across the interstate span.

One man suffered a broken jaw and several got cracked heads. The law and order group finally rounded up the scattered picket forces, escorting them to Glenwood, Iowa, and released them with orders to keep going north.

Governor Bryan of Nebraska, called at the height of the excitement here by one of the anti-picketing leaders, promised "as many deputy sheriffs as necessary" to keep the roads open.

The law and order forces are headed by Frank Buffington, a farmer, Sheriff DeMoss and County Attorney Whitney Gilliland, all of Glenwood.
